

Coast Tourney To Get Champ On Court Plan

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—The championship high school basketball tournament for the entire Pacific coast will be held annually in the University of Oregon's new \$250,000 basketball pavilion, if plans of Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics at the university, are approved by the executive council.

To assure that the tournament would leave no doubt as to the coast high school championship, the title winners in Eastern and Western Washington, Northern and Southern California, Eastern and Western Oregon, Idaho and Montana as well as the Portland high school champions would be invited to participate in the meet, according to Earl's plan.

Should eight or more accept, an elimination tourney would be held with a round robin tourney would be held if five or six teams accepted.

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NEW HOOP RULES ANALYZED HERE

East Oregon Coaches and Educators Discuss Basketball Changes

Approximately 20 coaches, superintendents and principals of Eastern Oregon high schools were here Saturday afternoon to meet in the local high school in a basketball rules discussion.

D. Towler, La Grande high principal, presided at the meeting and Jimmy Rosenbaum, official, led the discussion and interpretation of the new rules.

Afterwards the group went to the gymnasium where several high school players took part in a short game, during which the new rules were analyzed as to their effect on actual play.

Those in attendance, ranging from representatives from Baker Enterprise, declared that the meeting served a useful purpose in better acquainting them with the new rules and how they work out in a game.

Let Out At University

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—If E. Ellinger, line coach of the University of Oregon varsity football team, will not be reappointed to that position, according to information from university sources, Ellinger's contract was for one year, and upon its expiration no new contract will be signed.

Head Coach John McEwan is out of town on a hunting trip, and Jack Benefiel, graduate manager, is also out of town having left before news of the Ellinger case came up.

Ellinger is hired by the associated students of the university. He coached under McEwan at West Point, and was brought to Oregon when McEwan took the football helm here.

The action in letting Ellinger out is believed to have resulted from a liquor raid last summer. Ellinger was arrested but the case against him was dismissed. Ellinger, having been legally cleared of connection with the liquor party, went ahead with his coaching work, filling out his one-year contract.

SUICIDE WARNS MEN

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—August E. Wolmer, aged about 40, found dead yesterday in a gas filled room, left a note in which he warned all men "not to marry a woman from a matrimonial agency." Aggie Quintet Is Beaten by A. N. S.

ASHLAND, Ore., Dec. 20 (Special)—With a burst of speed and dazzling team play in the last half, Southern Oregon Normal school came from behind here Saturday night 50-10 defeated Oregon Agricultural college at basketball, 33-32, in one of the most breath-taking games ever witnessed in Southern Oregon.

The score stood tied at 32 with 45 seconds to go when Burr, star Aggie forward, made a personal foul on Ted Kinney, fleet normal guard and ex-Henson polytechnic basketball star of Portland. The 500 persons in the local armory held their breath as Kinney shot for the first free throw. As the ball sailed into the basket without touching a ring, the crowd gave a mighty roar, and 40 seconds later the game was over.

This is the first athletic contest in the history of the new Southern Oregon normal school, an institution which has but 35 male students, of which only 14 came out for basketball.

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 20 (AP)—With three veterans, Westergren, all-coast guard; Gunther, all-coast forward, and Okerberg, second team all-coast center, in good form, and Gordon Hiddings and Clarence Scallion in the other two berths, the University of Oregon basketball team is working hard these days to get into the proper shape for the coming season.

Scallion is a former Portland player, and was a star on last year's frosh five, while Hiddings, a former University high player of Eugene, was also a stellar performer on last year's frosh quintet. Scallion is at forward, and Hiddings at guard.

The team will work until the middle of the week, and then will disband for the Christmas period. A brainstorming trip will be taken into California during the week following Christmas.

Scallion played on the Franklin high school team of Portland and made the all-American high school quintet picked out the national intercollegiate tournament in 1925. Hiddings was a main cog in the team that won the state high school championship in 1921.
