In his belief, people have a right to rest and recreation of a wholesome character on Sunday, and held that one might, with propriety, sing hymns in church in the morning and go out in the afternoon; that it was up to the individual to keep his rest and recreation holy and clean, whether on the golf course, fishing streams, or mountains. And that none of these recreations of themselves need necessarily be indulged in with unholy motive. Of the Sunday theaters, he declared, morally could not be crammed down the throats of the people by legislation, and were the theaters closed, those denied that form of recreation, would not necessarily turn to the church for a substitute. It is up to the church to put on a program that will draw them from the theater.
