## Reynolds Family Holds Reunion On Farm Purchased Early in 1889

GHANGE HALL, Ore., Dec. 24. (Special)—Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Reynolds and daughter, Marjorie, and three sons, Charles, Lee and Earl, and their wives and children—15 in all—gathered at the Lee Reynolds home in this locality last week for a family reunion and dinner.

When it was decided that the 301 acre tract was not enough land for the owner to manage and, as he saw his way clear in purchasing more, he bought 30 acres joining on the south from Tay Thomas and sometime later 30 acres more joining on the east from Frank Hartness. Reynolds has the patent from the United States government, signed by President U. S. Grant, in his possession yet.

Plant Poplars  
In the spring of 1890, the rows of tall poplar trees that surround the house were planted by Alvin Fletcher and M. Reynolds, father of J. E. Reynolds. Fletcher was a friend of J. E. Reynolds' father from Iowa.

Wheat was the main grain crop raised on the farm and the yields averaged among the highest in the valley—the averages ranging from 50 to 54 bushels an acre for years in succession.

As time passed Reynolds worked into purebred livestock. Large farm horses were bred of registered clydesdale sires and berkshire hogs, shorthorn cattle, shropshire and hampshire sheep, all of the purebred classes were raised.

Raised Driving Horses  
A specialty was made of raising driving horses. The clydesdales, raised there, ranked with the best in the Northwest. They were shown at the state fairs and the Pacific International and many times won the grand championship. Two stallions were sold to A. B.

## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit sections, coddled eggs, crisp graham toast, cornmeal pancakes, syrup, milk, coffee.  
LUNCHEON—Potato timbales, hearts of celery, brown bread, apple sauce, poncorn drops, milk, tea.  
DINNER—Baked stuffed haddock, tomato sauce, scalloped potatoes, cabbage and carrot salad, whole wheat bread, orange jelly with whipped cream, vanilla wafers, milk, coffee.

The potato timbales provide an attractive way for using up left-over meat and potatoes. Of course hash is a perfectly good dish but it sometimes falls on its most loyal devotee. If left-over mashed potatoes are at hand, no butter need be used in seasoning.

Potato Timbales  
Four or five medium-sized potatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg (yolk), leftover meat, chill

Conley, who paid \$1,500 for one and \$1,200 for the other. Numerous sales were made. Walter M. Pierce, J. E. Huff and Baker brothers, all well known valley farmers, being among the purchasers. Being horses were sold to Dr. Mollitor, Dr. Willard Smith, E. E. Bragg and others.

Hogs were no small item on the farm. As many as 100 head were hatched in a year, and bacon and ham were sold. The Reynolds Dry Cured Hams became well known and the recipe was asked for and sent to the United States bureau of markets. Hogs sold as low as 3 cents a pound, on foot, and bacon in proportion.

Threshing Season  
For 15 years every fall one of the main events at the farm was getting the big steam threshing machine ready to start its seasons work. Grain was threshed in the Cove, Sandridge and Summerville districts. Steve Golden forked for the machine for 10 years and Bill Robbs worked on the hoe down for that long. The men worked all hours and moved from one farm to the other at night. The outfit has moved from Summerville to the Blackland place on the Sandridge after dark and the men were up at five o'clock in the morning and ready to go to work.
