Cobb, Speaker Seek Clear Bill In U. S. Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. (AP)—Friends of Ty Cobb and T. S. Speaker at the capitol, and elsewhere waited patiently today for the two former American league baseball managers to put in an appearance to lay their cases before government officials.

Just what action the men intend to take as a result of the charges made against them in documents made public last week by Kenesaw M. Landis, commissioner of baseball, had not been disclosed.

There were reports that they might ask an investigation of baseball under the anti-trust laws, or try to interest some members of congress in their cases in an official way, but no steps in such direction were apparent. No engagements were listed for them today at the department of justice or the post office department, while Senator Harris, democratic, Georgia, whose office Cobb was expected to visit had not been informed that he was in Washington.

Cobb and Speaker were reported last night as being en route to Washington but neither has been seen around his old haunts here.

Harris willing to help Senator Harris said today he was willing to assist Cobb in any way that he could.

"Cobb is a native of Georgia and is held in high regard by the whole state of Georgia," the senator said. "It seems to me that Cobb has been badly treated and certainly he has a case for damages in the courts. It appears to me to be a purely a legal matter, and I am ready to aid Cobb in any way that I can."

LULL PREVAILS IN MARK TODAY

Follows Big Rush of the Christmas Week—Butter Prices Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27. (AP)—The usual post-holiday lull prevails in the local produce markets today after the big rush of Christmas week. Most wholesale houses report a fairly heavy Christmas business, although nothing like a record week.

The poultry deal was the outstanding feature of the produce trade this year. Practically all lines maintained a firm tone throughout the week. Turkeys cleaned up at 45 to 46 cents, the ruling price during the holiday rush. There were some sales of fancy lots that went at 47 cents, and then there were sales of quantity lots down to 43 and 44 cents. Most of the top birds went to the retail trade around the 45-cent level.

Chickens, too, cleaned up at steady prices, although some late arrivals of scalded stock were carried over. Country dressed meats were not neglected entirely and prices were fairly well maintained throughout most of the week. Top calves and hogs moved out at the 16-cent level with occasional sales a half cent higher. Today the market is nominally steady at Friday's close.

New Commodity
Demand for a new commodity is being built up in this market. This year there was a noticeable call for dressed suckling pigs and dealers were scrambling to obtain lots for their trade. This delicacy, roasted whole for the holiday meal, retails around 75 cents a pound for little pigs under 15 pounds.

The butter market is steady with no season of the exchange since last Thursday. Butterfat is firm at the recent advance. Prices in the country range from 52 to 53 cents and from 54 to 55 cents for fats delivered Portland.

Reaction Noted In Wall Street Trading Today

NEW YORK, Dec. 27. (AP).—Stock prices turned reactionary this afternoon after an early display of strength. There was nothing in the day's news to explain the selling movement, which centered largely in the high grade industrials, although the decrease in manufacturing activity in November and December reported in the Federal Reserve Bulletin probably aroused some misgivings over the business outlook which were not entirely offset by the optimistic forecasts of leading bankers and businessmen published this morning.

Baldwin was quickly hammered down three points from its early high and General Motors and Allied Chemical and United States Steel common sold down a point or two.

New peak prices for the year were registered by Dupont, Liggett and Myers Coca Cola, International Harvester preferred, Eastman Kodak and several others.

The closing was irregular. Warner Brothers dropped 3 1/2 and Threshing Machine American Zinc preferred and South Porto Rico Sugar also lacked support. General Asphalt moved up more than three points with Pan-American "B," Atlantic Refining and Marient also in keen demand. Approximate sales were 1,550,000 shares.
