DAYTON, O., Dec. 29 (AP)—What holds up an airplane? Maintenance? Both guesses are wrong. Suction, on the top surface of the wing provides 75 per cent of the sustaining power that keeps the planes from fluttering down.

The wing's front edge is like the sharp edge of a wedge and the thickness reaches its maximum a few inches back. Then the top surface slopes down to a thin rear edge.

The wedge "splits" the air and sends it streaming back and up in practically a straight line. The swift rush of air creates a partial vacuum just above the surfaces of the wing and back of the thickest part. It is this partial vacuum that does three-fourths of the trick, aero-dynamic engineers at the government flying fields here assert. Buoyancy, they admit, does the rest.
