Mrs. Priddy was one mother of M. D. Priddy who served with Lee. He was the eldest of 12 children, six of whom are living. The youngest is 60. Her soldier son and her husband have been dead for several years.

Her memory, despite her advanced years, is keen. She recalls the day when the young men of the country marched away to the Mexican war and when the first buggy came into Pendler county.
