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Ochoco Project Failure Likely

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 30 (AP)—"If anything is to be done to save the project it should be done at once," was the conclusion reached relative to the Ochoco irrigation project in a report filed with the state irrigation securities commission yesterday by a special board ordered by the commission last March to make a survey and investigation of the project. The members of the board were W. L. Powers, soil expert for Oregon agricultural colleges; W. W. McClaughlin, engineer of the United States bureau of public roads; and M. H. Lapham, soil scientist connected with the federal bureau of soils.

The report declares that the project cannot succeed in its present condition for the reason that the terms of settlement and development cannot be met from the returns of the land and because the property indebtedness is greater than the value of both the land and the water.

Kukendall Is Not Willing to Accept

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WARN DEMOCRATS IN SMITH AFFAIR

Leader Urges Party to Let Smith Be Sworn in, Then Act

CHICAGO, Dec. 30 (AP)—The powers that guide the democratic party have been warned by one of their own political faith that denial of the oath of a United States senator to Colonel Frank L. Smith, of Illinois, "will be fatal to the party."

The prediction was made by Edward P. Dunn, former democratic governor of Illinois, who declared that such an act "would be the biggest blunder by the democrats since the civil war" and the death knell of Smith's rights.

Protesting the proposal of Senator Ashurst, democrat from Arizona, that the senate withhold the oath of Colonel Smith, the Illinois democratic leader appealed to the representatives of his party at Washington to keep their activity in the controversy over Smith's seating in strict accord with Jeffersonian principles.

Should Receive Oath
The senator-elect should be given his oath and allowed to present his credentials, after which he could be regularly refused a seat by a two-thirds vote, Dunne argued. Any other method, particularly in view of his appointment to a vacancy, will be fatal in any judgment, to the democratic party.

"I cannot conceive of political leaders nurtured in the school of Jefferson even giving consideration, much less support, to the terrible doctrine proposed by democratic members of the U. S. senate."

Would Hurt States Rights
"I won't hurt the republicans so much, because they constitute the party that has been naming judges who are carrying out the centralized government program of gradually extinguishing all state rights. The Ashurst proposal, if adopted, would mean the wiping out of the last vestige of state sovereignty which the federal constitution intended never should be done."

"COLD" VACCINES OR RIGHT LIVING?

Member Gorgas Memorial Inst. Preventive and curative vaccines for "colds" are becoming very popular. It is quite the vogue for folks to attempt to bolster up their resistance by a few "shots" now and then. There is a sound, scientific reason for their use. This method of creating anti-bodies to destroy the toxins produced by the peculiar infection causing colds is good enough doctrine. To make a poor attempt at a job, it is not to be "succeeded at."

But there is danger in depending solely upon vaccines to prevent colds. They create an unstable, passive immunity to colds, a temporary resistance which gives a wholly false sense of security.

There is only one way to build up bodily resistance, and to produce a more or less permanent active immunity to infections of all kinds, and that is by right living. Natural immunity to colds will become increasingly active as people gradually increase their power of knowledge to resist infection.

There is a popular delusion concerning drafts, which it is difficult to dispel even from the minds of the intelligent. It is commonly thought that colds following exposure to drafts are due solely to that cause. They are merely the predisposing cause.

Colds are bacterial infections of the respiratory tract. A draft is nothing more than air in motion and is beneficial, not harmful, if properly controlled and provided that the exposed are in good physical condition.

The physically unfit who so acutely avoid air currents within doors could safely ignore the draft bogey if their powers of resistance were developed and increased by hygienic living.

Overeating, impure air, lack of proper exercise, insufficient sleep, constipation, and "untrained skin" due to insufficient or improper bathing, and worry are the prime factors which in various combinations of unphysiological habits render people unfit to withstand the freezing germ-life which finds judgment along the respiratory tract.

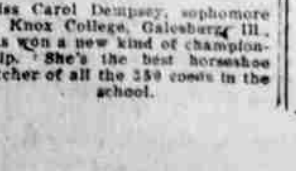
The mistake is nearly always made of placing the blame for physical disability on only one factor, the correction of which is deemed sufficient to withstand disease. A well rounded, evenly balanced regimen of hygienic living is what is needed to fortify the system against bronchitis, pneumonia, and tuberculosis, as well as diseases of the circulatory and digestive tracts.

The ordinary man in ordinary good health does not want to live hygienically. He is satisfied to go along blithely and carelessly, indifferent to the menace of disease which may be just around the corner. Then he is tripped up, his consciousness is dispelled, and he is awakened to the mocking realization that his assumed good health was an illusive dream.

This is the season of the year when pneumonia, knocks most insidiously at the door of the lungs, when tuberculosis seeks to overthrow the unit and the suavity. He who would successfully combat them will take stock of himself, cease his unwholesome habits, and cultivate the forces of resistance, by living the simple life.
