MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit sections, cereal, thin cream, salt cod-fish hash, toasted corn bread, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of Spinach soup, croutons, Boston baked

beans, Boston brown bread, orange souffle, milk, tea.

DINNER—Breaded veal cutlets, tomato sauce, baked sweet potatoes, beet and cabbage salad, vanilla ice cream with butterscotch sauce, crisp nut cookies, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The idea of serving a sauce over plain ice cream is worth keeping in mind for an emergency dessert. We sometimes hesitate to serve guests with cream from the corner drug store, feeling that it's a bit too obvious. But if a home-made sauce is added, we've had our own "finger in the pie" and feel better about it. If the sauce is put on to cook as soon as dinner is started, it can be made and cooled slightly before wanted.

Butterscotch Sauce

One cup light brown sugar, 1 tablespoon molasses, 1 teaspoon cornstarch, 1/4 cup butter, 1/4 cup water.

Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add molasses and water and bring to the boiling point. Boil over the fire until a few drops tested in cold water form a soft ball. Add butter and cook over boiling water, stirring frequently until the mixture is perfectly smooth and the butter is thoroughly incorporated. Cool slightly before serving. 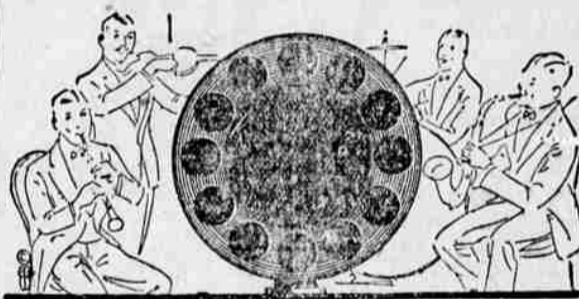

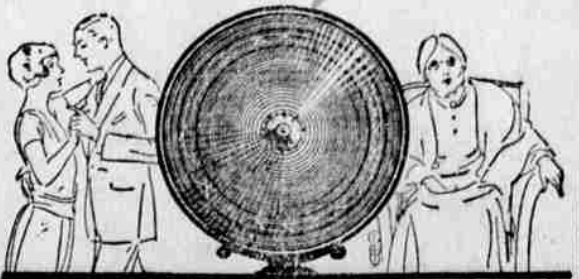
