PRODUCE PRICES RUNNING LOWER

Butter and Eggs Contin-
ue to Slump with Pro-
duction Heavy

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 4 (AP).—
Butter and egg prices continue
on a lower trend with production
running ahead of the requirements
for this market at this time of
year. On the dairy exchange all
grades of eggs, except povers, are
a cent lower with extras now pos-
ted at 40 cents. In the butter di-
vision all grades of cubes, except
firsts, are a half cent lower with
extras at 45 1/2 cents.

These production continue
heavy with the market generally
weak in the face of the cent in-
crease announced by the Tillamook
association.

An advance of 10 cents a sack
in wholesale sugar prices is gen-
erally effective this morning. Best
cane now quoted at \$6.95 and best
at \$6.85 a sack.

Country dressed meat arrivals
are limited and today's offerings
of fancy veal and pork went at
17 cents generally. Off grades
down to 15 1/2 and 16 cents.

Poultry offerings are limited
and prices firm. Demand espe-
cially strong for heavy fowl such
as turkeys and heavy hens. Quota-
tions unchanged.

Thompson Arrested After Woman Dies

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 4 (AP).—
Thomas Thompson, who once as-
sisted the Rev. Clement G. Clarke
in vice investigations here, was ar-
rested last night, charged with dis-
orderly conduct toward Mrs. Elea-
nore Wells, who died Sunday night
following alleged annoyance while
she was in a local picture theater
on New Year's eve. Thompson de-
nied any intention of rudeness to-
ward Mrs. Wells, and said if he
pressed against her, as alleged, he
must have fallen asleep in his seat
and leaned over unconsciously.

Reports Create Bear Sentiment In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (By the
Associated Press).—Speculators
for the decline succeeded in bring-
ing about a further reaction in
today's market. A large increase
in brokers' loans last week, dis-
quieting Mexican dispatches and
speculative disappointment over
the action of directors of the At-
chafson, Topka and Santa Fe rail-
road, in declaring an extra di-
vidend of only 75 cents, all tended
to create bearish sentiment, which
an easing off of money rates and
optimistic business forecasts
could not counteract.

Wall street apparently had an
inkling of the action to be taken
by Atchafson directors, as the
stock opened 4 1/2 points lower,
rallied above 16 1/2 just before the
dividend action was announced
and then sold down to 16 1/2, an
overnight loss of nearly six points.
Sharp reactions also took place
in such issues as Atlantic Coast
Line, Jersey Central and Westing-
house Air Brake.

The closing was steady. Active
buying of the market was renewed
in the final hour and their rise to
the best prices of the day over-
came the effect on sentiment pro-
duced by the disappointing Atchafson
dividend. General Motors
closed 1 1/2 and Baldwin 1 1/2. Total
sales approximated 1,400,000
shares.

Wheat Prices Go Much Lower Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 4 (By the As-
sociated Press).—Starting 3 1/2
to 4 lower, wheat showed but little
power to rally. Corn, oats and
provisions were affected by wheat,
corn opening 1/4 to 3/4 down, and
later undergoing a slight rally.
Wheat closed weak at a net
loss of 1 1/2 to 1 3/4; corn 1/4 to 1/2
higher; oats unchanged to a shade
up and provisions were unchanged
to the down.
