**Says Mermaids Are Real African Fish**  
 LONDON, Jan. 6 (AP)—Mermaids exist, says Baron de Fernig, a Dutch nobleman now visiting England. Baron Fernig has spent most of his life in South Africa and Kenya.

Mermaids, according to the baron, are queer fish that are caught by Swedish fishermen off the coast of East Africa north of Mozambique. They have heads with protruding eyes and a growth strangely like hair. Although they have no arms, the body down to the middle has a quite distinct likeness to the human form. They are more than five feet in length.
