BUTTER WEAKER; MEATS SCARCE

Top Grade Eggs Regain in Part Following Thursday's Break

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7 (AP).—With the two-cent decline in print butter now generally effective, sales are showing further weakness and top grades are off again on the dairy exchange. Extras were posted a half cent lower at 44 cents and standards a full cent lower at 42 1/2 cents. Undergrades were not changed after the severe decline Thursday.

Print butter is now down to 50 cents with the extreme offer for butterfat 52 cents, delivered Portland. The 52-cent offer, however, is for strictly No. 1 grade churning cream only.

Top grade eggs regained part of the big break made Thursday. Extras were bid up a cent to 54 cents but other grades remain weak and unchanged. Egg receipts are heavy.

Prices Higher

County dressed meats are raised and prices fractionally higher. Bayes are agor for choice light calves at 17 cents. Country hogs are unchanged at 17 cents. Receipts along the street are very light and arrivals move out promptly.

On account of a shortage of live poultry along the street dealers are paying as high as 23 cents for heavy hens and 22 cents up on light birds, depending on weight. Springs and broilers, too, are in demand, with offerings limited.

Bulls Control Exchange Again After Early Tilt

NEW YORK, Jan. 7 (By the Associated Press).—Speculators for the advance regained control of the price movement in today's stock market, after an early period of irregularity.

The announcement of a cut in prices by one of the smaller automobile manufacturers was seized upon by bear traders as an excuse for another attack on the motor shares. Quotations of several issues in that group were hammered down 1 to 2 points, but the temporary weakness of these issues failed to cause any unsettlement elsewhere. Most of the losses had been wiped out by early afternoon.

The demand for stocks embraced a wide list, with substantial gains recorded by a number of rail, equipment, steel, food, shipping and public utility shares.

St. Louis, Southwestern, Northern Pacific and Atchafalpa, each up two points or more, led the advance in the railroad group.

Baldwin, U. S. Steel common, Goodrich Rubber, Commercial Solvents B and Jones Brothers Tea were among the many strong spots in the industrial group.

The closing was strong. Substantial evidence that bullish sentiment still prevailed was shown in the final hour by a more general rise coincident with a jump in U. S. Steel to 157 1/2. St. Louis Sheffield Steel, Case Threshing Machine, International Paper, American Safety Razor and American Zinc preferred improved two to four points. Total sales approximated 1,200,000 shares.

Wheat closed unsettled at yesterday's finish to 2 1/2c higher; corn at 3/4 to 1/2c decline to 1/2c advance and provisions unchanged to 1/2c up.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Jan. 7 (AP).—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The wool market opens rather quietly, but with considerable confidence and not a little interest displayed in wool in certain quarters. Prices are steady this week with last demand being fairly general in character but chiefly for the finer domestic wools.

"The foreign primary markets are buoyant on general competition and prices are tending against the buyer everywhere. European secondary markets are steady. Japan is a keen buyer of wool. America has bought only about one-third in the foreign primary markets what she bought last season to date.

"The manufacturing position is regarded as sound and the prospects good for the coming year, although no one looks for any boom times.

"Mohair is moderately active and firm."
