KENOSHA, Wis., Jan. 8.—A Christmas distribution of more than \$500,000 in cash was made by the Nash Motors company among employees in its Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha plants. Disease Attacks Sheep in Idaho

LEWISTON, Ida., Jan. 7.—In the upper Salmon river region of Idaho county, the sheep industry, to which that section is admirably adapted, is being menaced at this time by foot rot among the bands. Drastic methods are being followed by the stockmen to combat the disease, paste being applied to the hoofs in many cases while others are using the bluestone placed in large tanks of water set out at frequent intervals through which the sheep are forced to wade. The question of fighting this disease, which is causing more trouble than scab, will be one of the topics for discussion at the meeting of the Idaho Wool Growers' association as weiser this week.

Turkey Growers Will Hold Sale in Boise Jan. 8

BOISE, Ida., Jan. 7.—The Idaho Licensed Turkey Growers' association will hold its first annual sale Jan. 8 to offer for sale purebred and standard breed toms and hens. Andrew S. Weiser, of Portland, Ore., member of the advisory board of the National Poultry Institute and one of the best known turkey specialists of the United States, has been named as judge. The sale will be held in Boise. The chamber of commerce has offered its cooperation and will obtain the building in which the sale will be held as well as provide entertainment for guests in the city for the sale.

Announcement of the event has aroused state-wide interest, judging from the number of inquiries to officials of the association. It is expected that the sale will be to the turkey raisers what the annual ram sale in Salt Lake is to that industry. Members of the association will consider a number of their best home and pens and prize will be offered for champion birds. Koger announces that the sale in no way conflicts with the Idaho State Poultry show, to be held in Caldwell the following week. On the contrary, breeders of the association will enter prize birds, Koger said.

Weiser, the turkey specialist, will tell breeders here what type of bird is most valuable for marketing.

FRANKLIN CAR TO BE SHOWN AT N. Y. SHOW

SYRACUSE, N. 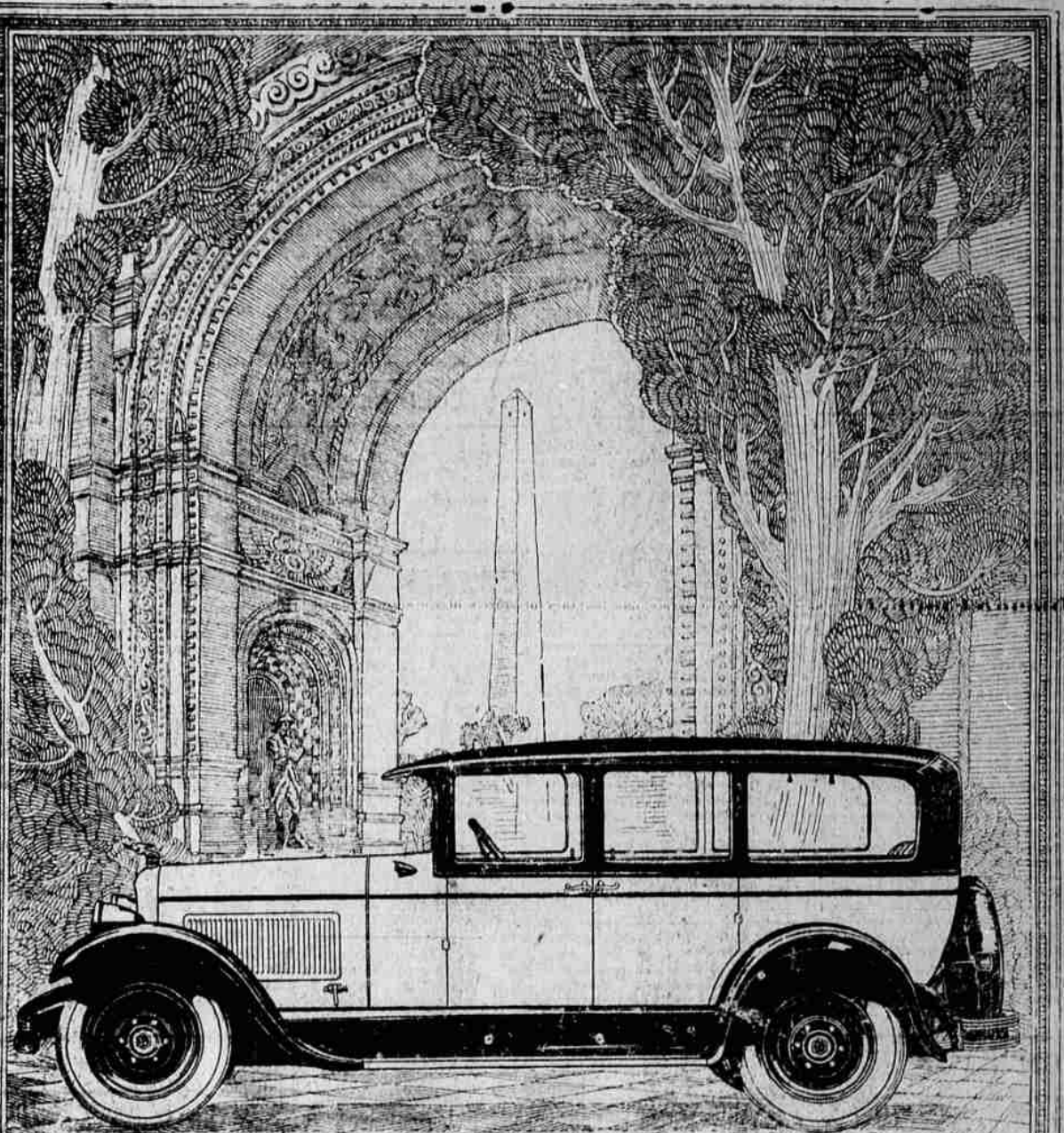
