LUNCHEON—Potato soup with cheese, toast sticks, lettuce sandwiches, grape float with boiled custard, milk, tea.

DINNER—Lamb stew, baked squash, cabbage and celery salad, rice soufflé, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The tendency through the winter months is to increase the amounts of fats and sweets and the outdoor worker and active youngsters need the richer diet. 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Prune Growers Suing Packers

ROSEBURG, Jan. 11 (AP).—M. Throno and O. O. Jennings, owners of a large prune ranch near Roseburg, filed suit in the circuit court here yesterday against W. E. Drager and Asahel Bush, Salem prune packers, for \$1,500. The growers claim that they delivered 125,556 pounds of prunes to the packers in 1925, with the agreement that they would receive four cents per pound profit on the sale of the fruit. Settlement on this basis was made on 35,848 pounds. It is claimed, but no payment was made on the balance. In 1924 the packers returned 36,600 pounds of the fruit, the growers allege, leaving approximately 11 tons unaccounted for.

422 New Families Settle in County

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 11 (AP).—Josephine county, during 1926, acquired 422 new families, the greater number of those settling on small tracts in the Grants Pass Irrigation district. Figures given are authentic as the chamber of commerce has submitted a complete list. Belief has been expressed that this list can be greatly augmented and an effort has been started to secure additional names. Officials of the chamber state that the irrigation district will be settled completely within the year, if the same rate of settlement is continued.

CATTLEMEN TO MEET

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11 (AP).—Owners of purebred guernsey cattle from all sections of the state will gather in Portland for the annual meeting of the Oregon Guernsey Cattle club at the Hotel Portland on Monday, Jan. 17. The session will take up the entire day, with a get-together luncheon at 11:30 a. m. A feature of the program will be working out of plans for the annual "guernsey gallop," in which the Oregon breeders are each year joined by scores of guernsey men and their families from adjoining states.
