EGGS SLUMP ONE TO TWO CENTS

Extras Drop to 34-Cent Level—Top Grade Butter Firmer

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11 (AP).—Fresh eggs are lower today on the local exchange with quotations off one and two cents. Extras dropped to the 34-cent level, firsts declined a cent to 32 cents and current receipts broke to 29 cents a dozen. The market is weak with receipts liberal. Medium sized eggs of pullets are now worth more than firsts, as there is less shipping demand for mixed colors.

Top grade extra butter is 1 to 1 1/2c higher, due to the firmer tone shown outside. Chicago, San Francisco and other coast markets are fractionally higher this week. On the local board extras were posted 1 1/2c higher at 45 cents and standards a cent higher at 43 1/2c. Other grades remained steady and unchanged.

Butter receipts are limited, along the coast and prices are fully maintained. Heavy lots sold promptly at 25 cents with light lots at 22 cents.

Trade Irregular In Wall Street; Oils In Demand

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (By the Associated Press).—Alternate periods of weakness and strength characterized today's stock market as control of the price movement shifted from "bull" to "bear" traders. Trading was rather light in volume, with no indications of any widespread public participation.

A brisk demand for the eastern railroad shares featured the early afternoon dealings and checked the selling movement which started in the motor shares.

Elastic fluctuations took place in Commercial Solvents B, which sold down over five points to 24 1/2 in the early trading and then snapped back to 25 1/2, a record high for all time. Allied Chemical and DuPont sold down four points and business also developed in U. S. Steel common, Baldwin, General Motors and other recent leaders.

An unusually brisk demand developed for several of the oil shares.

The closing was irregular, British buying of Wheeling and Lake Erie shares caused purchases of other low priced rail issues. Various industrials, however, sold under cover of the strength shown by standard railroads. Total sales approximated 1,200,000 shares.

Mention Cities in Convention Race

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP).—Members of the democratic national committee were advised today by Chairman Shaver the 11 cities have been "suggested or mentioned" for the next democratic national convention. They are Des Moines, Denver, Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Louisville, Atlanta, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

"At least two or three of these are now preparing to extend an invitation in the proper form," said the chairman's letter. He made no further comment.

Wheat Closes Weak After Early Gains

CHICAGO, Jan. 11 (By the Associated Press).—Opening unchanged to 3/4c off, wheat soon scored gains. Corn, oats and provisions developed firmness, corn starting unchanged to 3/4c up, and continuing to ascend.

Wheat closed weak, 1/4 to 3/4c net lower; corn unchanged to 3/4c off; oats unchanged to 3/4c down and provisions showing 12 to 25c gain.

Stool Pigeons Frowned On In The U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP).—The senate today called on the treasury for a full report of the activities and expenditures of "under cover" agents of the prohibition unit.

Democrats in senate yesterday engaged in a discussion of the part prohibition will play in the 1928 presidential campaign and whether a "wet" or a "dry" will be their candidate.

Senator Bruce, of Maryland, served notice on democratic "drys" that, if a dry presidential candidate was elected the wets would hold another convention to select another nominee. He declared that Governor Al Smith of New York, or Ritchie, of Maryland, would be the outstanding possibilities.

The political prognostication was injected following an attack by Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, on the prohibition unit for using "under cover" agents. He condemned the practice as a "spy system" and introduced a resolution calling upon Internal Revenue Commissioner Blair and Assistant Secretary Andrews, of the treasury, to account for the expenditures of these agents. The resolution went over until tomorrow.

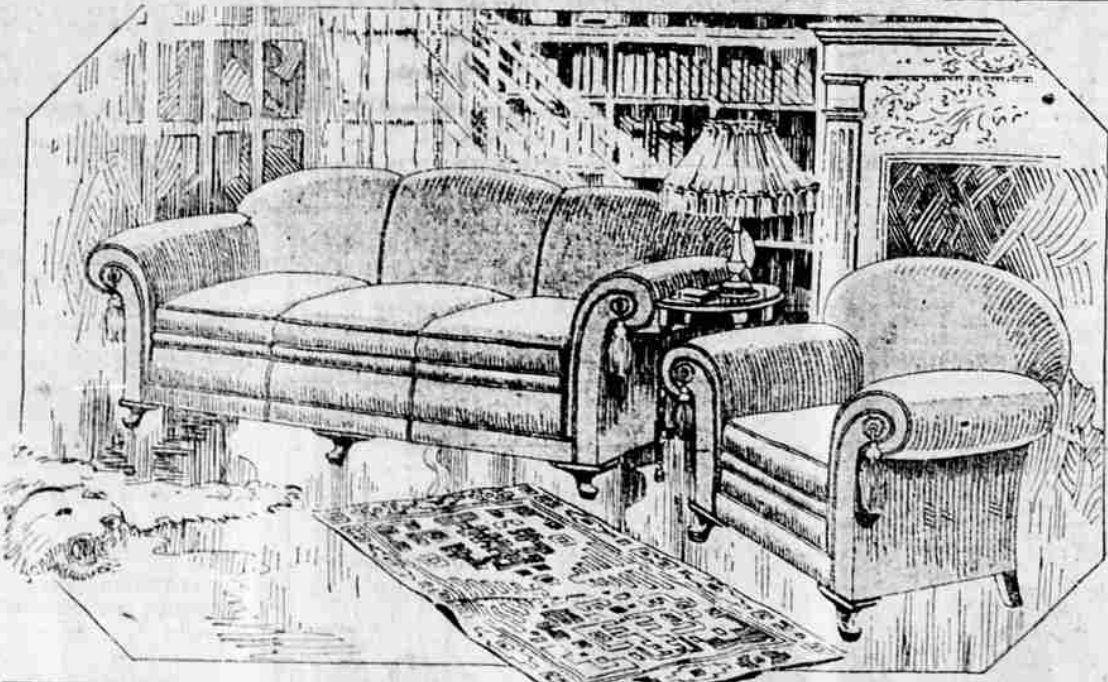

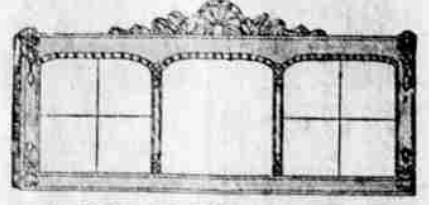
