Fourth Member of Amity, Oregon Family Passes

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP)—Vital organs of A. R. Griffith, head of fourth member of a family living just west of Amity, to have succumbed to a mysterious malady in the past 10 days, were forwarded to Portland late Tuesday afternoon following an autopsy after his death about 3 o'clock. Contents of the stomach will be analyzed for traces of poison, it was stated by Dr. R. A. Jaynes attending physician, who was assisted by Dr. Heitzel, Yamhill county health officer. Whether the cause of death was accidental or not the attending physicians would not say other than the victim had been using canned vegetables and meats to a great extent and that some form of poisoning was suspected. Results of the post mortem held late Tuesday night were not divulged, but the organs were sent to Portland for verification of the findings of the local physicians. Mrs. Griffith is the only member of a family of seven who has not yet been stricken. She is suffering from the strain and the loss of the others.

It is rumored here that the drinking water used by the Griffith family might be responsible for the deaths. The Griffiths are said to have been using water from a rain barrel for drinking purposes.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP)—State health officer Frederick W. Stricker today announced that he will visit Amity as soon as possible and make a thorough re-examination of the case of the Griffith family. Analysis of the vital organs of the victims, has not been completed.

Would Increase Legal Speed of Autos And Raise Age Limit to 18

STATE HOUSE SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP)—Legal speed of autos would be increased from 30 to 35 miles an hour under bills introduced in the legislature by Senator Miller, of Josephine county, and Representative Hamilton, of Clatsop county.

Senate and house have adopted a joint letter to congress asking that the Longview bridge bill, passed by the national house of representatives be amended so that if the specifications passed upon by the secretaries of war, commerce and agriculture are not satisfactory to Portland, they may be changed, Portland to bear the added cost of construction.

Representative Hazlett, of Hood River, has introduced a joint resolution which would repeal that section of the law providing that state may guarantee and pay interest on bonds issued by the irrigation districts for a period of five years from date of issuance.

House joint resolution No. 1, introduced by Representative Swan, of Lane county, would prevent increases in salaries during tenure of offices of persons affected.

Children under 15 years of age would be prohibited from driving motor vehicles under house bill No. 1, introduced yesterday afternoon by Representative Buchanan, Benton county. Under the present law, minors 15 years old may obtain drivers licenses.

Homesteaders would be exempt from liens or judgments against their property to the sum of \$5,000, under a bill introduced by Representative Bailey, Multnomah county. The present exemption is to the sum of \$3,000.

It will not be necessary for the legislature to reappropriate the \$100,000 appropriated for establishment of an Eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital according to an opinion to the state board of control by Attorney General Van Winkle.
