Screen players have favorites among their past characterizations and also roles in which they are ambitious to appear in the future. Here are the parts a few liked best: Ramon Novarro, "Ben Hur"; Norma Shearer, "His Secretary"; Renee Adoree, the French girl in "The Big Parade"; and John Gilbert, his leading part in the same picture; Claire Windsor, her role in "Dance Madness"; and Allen Franke, the queen in "Three Weeks."
