MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Rolled oats with chopped dates, thin cream, creamed salt codfish, cornmeal muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Dried pea humbles, creamed carrots, apple sauce, ginger bread, graham bread, milk, tea.

DINNER—Veal steak, tomato and mushroom sauce, stewed rice, date and banana salad, lemon sponge pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

THE EYE—SELF-LUBRICATING SELF-CLEANSING!

Member Guyton Memorial Inst. Under ordinary circumstances, the eye of the normal adult is a self-cleansing, self-lubricating, and self-regulating mechanism.

The tears that originate in a small gland in the upper lid, pour out in increased volume when the eye is irritated and endeavor to wash away the irritating or noxious substances that may be present.

The lubrication that is necessary to allow the eyelid to glide smoothly over the eyeball, without sticking, is provided by the oily material that comes from modified sweat glands that open on the inner surface of the upper and lower eyelids.

Usually there is but a small amount of secretion from these glands but, when the eye is inflamed, the secretion may be so great that a thin film of oil spreads over the front of the eyeball and even interferes with vision.

The self-regulating part is more complex. The colored part of the eye forms a curtain with a hole in the center, known as the pupil. When the light is bright, the pupil automatically becomes smaller in order that the interior of the eye may not be flooded with an excess of possibly injurious light. The pupil dilates automatically when light grows less.

Were the eye constructed as a camera, glasses would be worn by people past the age of forty-five. These eyes have undergone the change of advancing age that comes as surely as death or taxes—presbyopia.

But, unfortunately, nature was not omniscient and some eyes are too short and some eyes are too long and some eyes are too oval. However, the development of the glassmaker's art has kept pace with the increasing difficulties that advancing civilization throws into the path of mankind and the poor vision entailed by anatomical malfunctions can be overcome for the most part.

The far-sighted eye, which may have perfect vision only by reason of unconscious effort on the part of its owner, only too often is the source of the persistent nagging headaches that may appear any place above the collar at any time of the day or night. And it is so simple to relieve that eye of the overtaxing burden by means of a glass.

The near-sighted eye is not so apt to cause physical discomfort; but it plays a far greater role in framing the destiny of its owner. Due to the poor distant vision, the near-sighted individual is apt to become a bookworm, for only at reading distance or less can he read. Consequently, he immerses himself in a book and pictures the outside world in his imagination and not with his eyes.

Under continued reading, he withdraws himself more and more into his shell, his nearsightedness increases by leaps and bounds, and eventually there is developed a full-blown, peering "crab". Such an abnormal development is eliminated by the use of proper glasses. Your eyes are self-lubricating, and self-regulating, but like your

COOKING HINTS

Brownies
