MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit sections, cereal, thin cream, fried cornmeal mush, sirup, crisp granular toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Potato and turnip puree, toast sticks, open lettuce sandwiches, canned peaches, sponge cake, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked turban of fish, tartar sauce, scalloped potatoes, buttered parsnips, cabbage and celery salad, pineapple cream pudding, bran rolls, milk, coffee.

After parsnips have been frozen they are much better than if dug before the frost penetrates through the ground. The flavor, as well as the texture of the vegetable, is improved. If you used parsnips early in the fall without success, try them now and notice the difference.

Potato and Turnip Puree—Four white turnips, four potatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 bouillon cubes, 1 blade celery, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 4 cups veal stock.
