The accident occurred Jan. 5, and she died three days later in the county hospital. The hospital authorities overlooked making a report at that time.

FINED \$100

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 17 (AP)—Anton Ring, a mountaineer, living in the Elk creek district, was fined \$100 and sentenced to four months in jail for illegal possession of deer meat and sale of deer meat. Six game officials raided his cabin Sunday. Ring, they say, readily admitted his guilt and is alleged to be a member of a gang of commercial hunters operating in Southern Oregon. Over 50 pounds of jerky was seized.

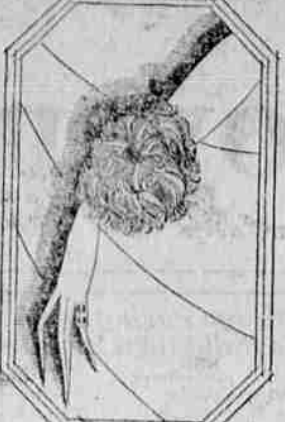

FOUR CITIES IN OREGON SEEK AID

Astoria, Portland, Corvallis, Klamath Falls Want Postoffices

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—A program providing for new post offices or federal buildings or enlargement of present structures in more than 200 cities has been prepared for congress by the treasury and post office departments.

The allotments were made under the \$100,000,000 act passed at the last session of congress, but appropriation of another \$100,000,000 probably will be required to carry into effect the full program which is to be stretched over a five-year period. Legislation for that purpose already is pending.

Projects listed in the recommendation are in addition to those for which allotments were made several months ago.

The recommendations include: Portland—New federal post office building on a new site at a cost of \$1,350,000 and site of present court house building and site valued at \$1,200,000.

Astoria—New building on present site \$210,000.

Corvallis—Described as having the largest postal receipts of any city in Oregon not having a federal building. New building and site recommended, \$135,000.

Klamath Falls—New building and site, \$130,000.

WELL GUARDED

Having held the same post before, Cesar is qualified to handle the many international problems which the Central American situation has made intricate.

Rebels Defeated in Bloody Fight; Battle in Progress at San Patrolo

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 17 (AP)—Twenty-seven rebels, two officers, 11 soldiers and a policeman were killed when federal forces commanded by General Ferrera, military commandant of the state of Jalisco, defeated rebellion forces at Paradon, Loma Larga and Chapadros Friday night. Special dispatches describing these engagements say that General Ferrera, heading a strong column, left Guadalajara Thursday when he was notified that numerous rebels had laid siege to the town of Paradon which was defended by a detachment of municipal police.

The rebels offered strong resistance at Paradon, being forced to retreat to Loma Larga and thence to Chapadros, where they finally were defeated. General Ferrera resumed his march to Tepatlitan Saturday morning.

REBELS DEFEATED IN BLOODY FIGHT; BATTLE IN PROGRESS AT SAN PATROLO

From Durango special dispatches report a battle has been going on since Saturday at San Patrolo between federal forces commanded by General Lopez and a band of rebels under Tiro Guerrero and Domingo Barzaga. Three hundred rebels are reported to be fighting desperately against 250 soldiers.

Barzaga, described in the special dispatch as a prominent Catholic leader who, with Guerrero, revolted in the Mesquital district under the banner "for my god and my country" was killed in battle at San Patrolo, his body being exhibited at Durango City.
