WOMEN NIBBLE TOO MUCH

LONDON (AP) - Women nibble the house are always nibbling at something and therefore eat too much, says Dr. James Denton, medical officer of health for Kensington.

Addressing an assemblage composed largely of women at the Incorporated Institute of Hygiene the doctor indicated that a domestic servant in England has six or seven meals a day, "and often eats far more than her master."

"The woman who indulges in over-eating and over-drinking risks a muddly, shiny, or spotty complexion," said Dr. Denton.

Women Bankrupts Increase

LONDON (AP) - The number of women bankrupts in England during 1925 totaled 440, or 27 more than in the previous year, board of trade statistics show. Millinery and dressmaking had the greatest number of failures, 47, while to the others 37 were drapers, 33 grocers, 21 clothing and outfitters and 20 lodging-house keepers, four school-mistresses and one doctor.

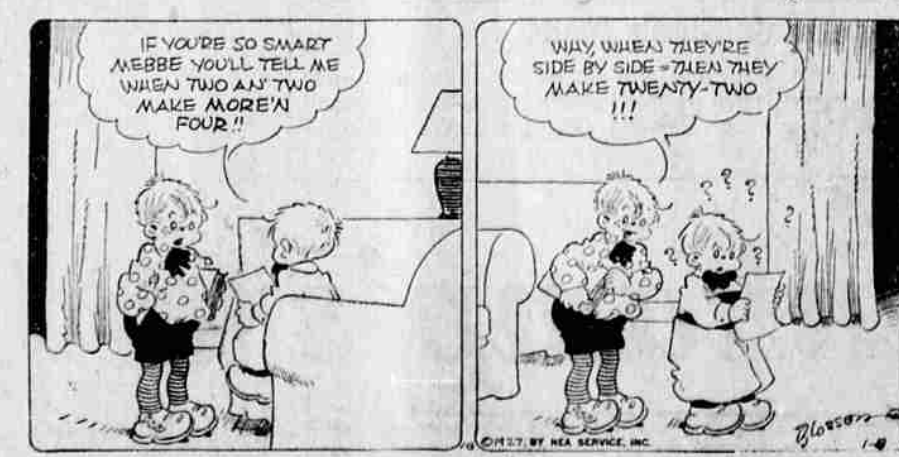
