CUBE BUTTER IS SHARPLY HIGHER

Advances Range from One to One and a Half Cents in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 18 (AP) Cube butter prices are sharply higher on the local dairy exchange today with advances ranging from 1 to 1 1/2 cents throughout the entire lot.

Receipts in this market continue liberal but strength in outside markets with a broader outlet brought about the upward swing in local values.

Changes in the fresh egg market for the day were limited to a cent advance in pullet eggs at 30 cents.

Weakness in now general throughout the poultry list and it would not take much increase in receipts to force lower levels.

Heavy hens are slow at 25 to 26 cents, with the bulk of the sales at the lower mark.

Eighteen cents remains the extreme top of country calves with thin and heavy veal going at 17 to 17 1/2 cents.

Not only a firmer tone is shown in the local wholesale apple market but values are also more firmly established at primary points.

Wheat Prices Go Higher in Chicago

CHICAGO, Jan. 18 (By Associated Press)—Opening 3/4 to 5/8 higher, Chicago wheat prices secured material further gains.

Wheat closed strong, 3/4 to 1/2 cent higher; corn 1/2 to 3/8 cent up; oats at 3/4 to 1/2 cent advance and provisions varying from 5c decline to 2 1/2 cent advance.

Confused Price Movement Again Seen in Street

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (By the Associated Press)—Confused price movements again characterized today's stock market. Selling pressure against the industrials which have been heavy for several days, appeared to have subsided somewhat while the advance in the rails was retarded by profit-taking although several new high records were recorded in that group.

Speculation in the rail group continued to center in those issues which are likely to be included in the several consolidations reported to be pending.

Pools were again active in a number of specialties, International Business Machines, General Railway Signal, Vlek Chemical, Remington Typewriter, and R. H. Macy standing out with gains of 1 1/2 to 6 1/2 points.

Standard industrials and rails moved within rather narrow and irregular limits.

The closing was irregular. Selling of pivotal industrials, concurrent with the marking up of various rails to new high levels featured the late afternoon dealings. Baltimore and Ohio sold at 112 and Missouri Pacific at 97 3/4. Baldwin went down to 145 and U. S. Steel common was quoted below 155. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.
