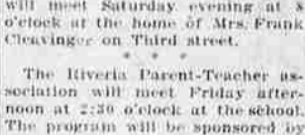

## MENUS

**BREAKFAST**—Grapefruit sections, scrambled eggs with rice, crisp broiled bacon, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Split pea soup, toast sticks, open lettuce and cream cheese sandwiches, steamed lemon pudding, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Braised halibut, little potatoes, buttered beets, cole slaw, apple tapioca pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The fish suggested in the dinner menu is simmered, slowly covered in well-seasoned, sifted tomato pulp until tender—for about one hour. Any firm, boneless fish can be used as cod or filets of flounder. Sear the fish quickly on both sides before adding the liquid.

**Steamed Lemon Pudding**

Two eggs, 3/4 cup granulated sugar, 1 lemon, 2 tablespoons water, 2-3 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, few grains salt.

Beat yolks of eggs until thick and lemon-colored, gradually adding the sugar. Combine juice and grated rind of lemon with water and beat into first mixture. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add to first mixture and fold in the whites of the eggs, beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a well-buttered mold and steam for 40 minutes. Serve with apricot sauce.

The sauce is made by thickening the juice from canned apricots.
