KLAMATH BELOW ZERO

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—Coldest temperatures of the winter, one degree below zero, was recorded here last night. Clear skies and bright sun this morning failed to detract from the chill of a freeze from the north.

IS ABOVE IN ROSEBURG

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—Except for the cold snap of Dec. 1924 the temperature recorded at 8 o'clock this morning was the lowest since 1919. The mercury this morning dropped to 18 degrees. In Dec. of 1924 the temperature, went to 11 degrees but outside of that cold spell, today's record is the lowest in eight years. The freeze has probably done some damage to broccoli, as it is being followed by bright sunshine. Hard frosts followed by a bright sun is very injurious to broccoli plants injuring the soft part in the center of the stalk. The full extent of the damage, however, cannot be determined until the plants begin to head up.

EUGENE CHILLY

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—While a bright, cold moon shone brilliantly last night, Eugene's official mercury slumped down to the 14 degree level, the coldest since December 1924.

Today the sun replaced the moon according to schedule, but made little difference in the temperature.

ROGUE RIVER COLD

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—Temperatures dropped in the Rogue River valley last night when the second cold spell of the winter bit this section. A minimum temperature of 22 degrees was recorded here during the night and today a cold east wind gave promise of colder weather tonight. Last night was the second coldest of the year.

12 BELOW IN PENDLETON

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—Pendleton experienced an exceedingly cold night last night when the mercury reached 12 degrees below zero, this morning at 10 o'clock the thermometer stood at 2 degrees above, the sun relieving the situation.

Fire this morning destroyed a residence in the south part of the city. Firemen stood helplessly by and watched the flames as the nearest hydrant was frozen solid. The loss was estimated at \$3500.

SALEM COLD

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—Registering the coldest temperature that has been experienced since Dec. 1924, the mercury here last night dropped to a point 11 degrees above zero, according to the official weather bureau report.

18.5 ABOVE IN MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)—The mercury dropped to 18.5 degrees last night the coldest of the season. The sun is shining brightly today with a crisp breeze from the east.

"People now say," Moser complained, "that they don't understand how men can come here for \$3, and they seem to think there is some graft in it. You and I know there isn't."

"Senator Moser says he knows there is no graft here," Senator Joseph said. "He may know it, but I don't. I have seen men come here wearing blind-mades and by the middle of the session they would be wearing tailor-made clothes."

The resolution's reference to "expense money," Senator Eddy branded as a subterfuge.

A hearing that was set for next Monday night by the special senate committee, named to investigate the state text book commission and the state board of education, has been postponed to next Tuesday night.

The senate late yesterday adopted the Mar'erson house joint resolution for the appointment of a special committee of three representatives and two senators appointed by the respective presiding officers to make a study of a more simple and efficient machinery of state government with consolidation in view. The resolution requires the committee to report to the present legislature not later than the 20th day of the session.
