YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 6.

Of the millions of taxpayers who file returns for the year 1926, the vast majority are entitled, in addition to the personal exemptions of \$2500 for married persons and heads of families, \$1500 for single persons, and a \$400 credit for each dependent, to a further credit of 25 per cent of the tax on their earned net income. Correctly to compute this credit, the taxpayer first must compute the amount of tax which would be payable without the earned income credit. From the amount of the tax, 25 per cent is to be deducted, the balance being the amount of tax due.

In the allowance of the 25 per cent credit, the return was taken into consideration for the first time under the revenue act of 1926. The maximum amount which may be claimed as earned income is increased from \$10,000 to \$20,000. Earned income is defined as "wages, professional fees, and other amounts received as compensation for personal services actually rendered."

However, all net income up to \$2000, whether actually earned or not, is considered earned income for the purpose of the 25 per cent credit. A taxpayer may have received in 1926 a salary of \$2400 and from a real estate transaction, or sale of stock, a net profit of \$2600. Nevertheless, the entire \$5000 is considered as earned income, unmarried and with no dependents. In such case is computed as follows:

Net income.....\$5000
Less personal exemption.....1500
Balance taxable at 1 1/2%.....\$3500
1 1/2% of \$3500.....\$52.50
Less one-fourth of \$52.50, earned income credit.....13.12
Balance of tax payable.....\$39.37

Other examples showing how to compute correctly the earned income credit will be given.
