Thrift Sunday To Be Observed In Two Churches

Ordination Service Will Be Held in Christian Church—Other Special Programs Out.

Thrift Sunday, closing a week devoted to practicing the " Gospel of Benjamin Franklin, will be observed in at least two Protestant churches tomorrow—the First Baptist church and the Zion Lutheran church.

The programs follow: Lutheran Church This church will observe Thrift Sunday by a sermon of the pastor, Rev. L. H. Ayres, on "The True Motive of Thrift" at 11 o'clock. The Sunday school meets at 9:45 a. m., with graded classes for all ages.

The evening service, beginning at 7 o'clock, will open with the following program: Arie from "Hilf" (Handel) and Largo (Handel). The song service will consist of hymns and songs from the new book.

Frederic Matice Jr. will speak on "How Can We Train for Service" and campaign girls will tell "what they understand by the spirit of Christian service and cite definite instances of such service."

Veria McLane will tell of incidents from the life of the great saint, David Livingstone. A vocal solo will then be rendered by Veria McLane and Marie Neumann. The pastor will give the closing message on "The Meaning of Prayer."

Baptist Church The observance of Thrift Sunday will be taken notice of by the Rev. George Albert Dollard, Baptist church pastor, during the junior sermon Sunday. The matter, however, will interest old as well as young and he cordially invites the public to attend.

Sunday school begins at 9:15 a. m. and the morning worship at 11 o'clock. Mr. Dollard's sermon will be "Triumphs of the Bible" and for the children "The Religion of Thrift."

Evening services will begin at 7:30 o'clock. The sermon will be on "Andrew," the sixth sermon in the series "People Who Came to Jesus, and Why."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—Travelers in Europe who change upon a handsome skin, suit or other cloth may, in the future, find it easier to obtain such a gift for their churches in America, if congress acts favorably on a bill now before it.
