Farm Pointers

Nitrate fertilizer applied to Oregon apple orchards in late winter or early spring gives ample time for the trees to assimilate the nitrogen for the summer fruit crop, says the experiment station. Nitrate fertilizer applied in the late spring keeps the fruit green past the natural ripening period.

Sulfur fertilizers applied to Oregon alfalfa fields in early spring allows the sulfur sufficient time to oxidize to sulfate form according to experiment station. Elemental sulfur until oxidized to the sulfate form is not available for crop growth. This is the reason for applying the sulfur early and burrowing it in so that it may be in available form for the first crop.

Honey combs stored inside are fumigated with carbon bisulfide to prevent infestation by wax moths, experiment station. Combs outside during the winter are not subject to wax moth attack. Carbon bisulfide is inflammable but requires 60 degrees F. to give good results. Sulfur fumes have proved effective in wax moth control.
