**BIG LOSSES ARE SUFFERED TODAY**

**Wheeling and Lake Erie Common Skyrocket to 65 1/2 Points**

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (By the Associated Press).—A sensational stock market coup, directed against a trapped short interest in the common stock of Wheeling and Lake Erie railroad today sent that issue catapulting 1 1/2 points to a record high of 65 1/2 points a share. Losses sustained by bear traders were conservatively estimated at a minimum of \$1,500,000 with the possibility that they may reach several times that figure.

The common stock has been on the upgrade since the first of the year, rising from a low of \$27.50 a share on buying influenced largely by merger reports and talk of competitive buying for control.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP).—Huge losses which may run into the millions of dollars have been sustained by "bear" traders on the New York stock exchange in what to all outward appearances today was a "normal" in the common and preferred stocks of the Wheeling and Lake Erie railroad.

Such gyrations invariably unsettle the general market, and today was no exception, although when it became apparent that the immediate needs of the trapped shorts in Wheeling had been satisfied, the market began to gather strength again. The recent advance in raw sugar prices stimulated the demand for sugar shares. South Porto Rican soaring seven points and Great Western 3 1/2.

**Dairy Farmers Get \$28,174.42 in Checks for Cream**  
VALLE, Ore., Jan. 28.—Malheur county is coming to the front as a dairy section, judging from general reports concerning the county. Nineteen twenty-six showed a big increase over 1925 in the Valle branch of the Farmers Cooperative Creamery association. Figures compiled by W. T. Atherton, local manager, show that 8999 pounds more cream was received at Valle than in the previous year.

What the cream business amounts to for the farmers of this section can readily be seen by other figures. Atherton has on record. Cream checks have totaled \$24,581.77 for the year, monthly dividends \$3,286.23 and the annual dividends to patrons amounted to \$1,244.42, a grand total of \$28,174.42. Valle farmers have received for 1926 business.
