Chocolate Cake

Two squares bitter chocolate, 1 cup sweet milk, 1-3 cup butter, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 1/2 cups flour, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Melt chocolate in 1/2 cup milk and cook to a paste. Cream butter and beat in sugar, add first mixture. Beat yolks of eggs until light with remaining milk and add alternately with flour to first mixture. Add vanilla salt and soda dissolved in a little cold water. Beat hard for two minutes and turn into a dripping pan lightly oiled and floured.

Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. When cake is cool, cover with a boiled icing made with the whites of the eggs. Cover the icing

German women are scoring professional victories in the field of higher education, hitherto almost

exclusively in the hands of men. The University of Kiel has appointed its first woman instructor in Frautlein Brumentruide von Ranke who will teach medieval and modern history. Frautlein von Ranke is 29 years of age and an eminent scholar. The University of Hamburg is considering a woman for a professorship of philosophy.

## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Apples, cereal cooked with dates, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, fried cornmeal mush syrup, milk, coffee.
