Bishops' Crusade Here to End on Sunday Evening

Musical Program Is Arranged for Final Service—The Rev. Mr. Kopp Speaks in Morning.

The Bishops' Crusade, which was started in St. Peter's Episcopal church here Friday will close tomorrow evening as far as La Grande is concerned. Considerable interest outside of the Episcopal church is being shown in the campaign, it is said.

The crusade initiated this year by the bishops of the Episcopal church throughout the nation seeks to bring to each individual renewed spiritual life and a closer fellowship with Jesus. It is not a scheme to increase offerings nor primarily to increase membership, it is said, but an earnest and united effort to liberate everywhere the power of personality in the service of Christ, and to lift the whole level of church life in each community so that all churches and all persons may receive some impetus and spur toward greater work for the establishment of God's Kingdom.

A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend the meetings.

Sunday Services
Sunday services begin at 8 a. m. with holy eucharist, followed by church school at 9:45 a. m. At 11 o'clock the crusader stationed here, the Rev. C. A. Kopp, of Knappton, Mont., will deliver the sermon. At 5:45 p. m. the Wayfarers' Guild will hold its second debate.

In the evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, a musical service under the direction of Mrs. G. S. Brienle will precede an address on

"The Saints Uplifted Hands" by the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector. During the musical service Mrs. M. L. Stearns, of Union, will sing a solo "Prayer Perfect" by E. J. Stenson, and Mrs. A. E. Kimon and Miss Mae Stearns will play a violin duet, accompanied by Mrs. H. N. Ashby at the piano.

La Grande Man Tells Story of His Redemption

Ensign Ronald M. Eberhart, of the Salvation Army, Recalls His Conversion to Christ.

A story of redemption, as told by Ensign Ronald M. Eberhart, formerly of La Grande, is carried in the current issue of "The War Cry," the Salvation Army publication.

Eberhart, who many local people know, is now with headquarters staff in San Francisco. In his article, printed below, the railroad machine shop he refers to is the O.-W. shops here and the woman who converted him is Adjutant Childers.

His story follows:
"I was born in a little town in Western New York, many years ago, and have made a number of moves since; geographically, physically, mentally, spiritually and vocationally.

"My first move of importance was to quit school when I was fifteen because I thought a grammar school education was enough, and besides I wanted to make some 'big money.'

"I went to work in a railroad machine shop as an apprentice to the machine trade. I learned quickly. The subject is to be 'Justification.' Each person is requested to find all the references they can on the subject. The old hymns will be sung.

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and did well for a season, but soon wearily of the small pay. After a short stay of about three-fourths of a year, I looked for something that would give quicker returns.

"I had played a snare drum in the town amateur band and after purchasing a bass drum with the rest of the paraphernalia that goes with the ordinary trap drummer's outfit, I got a position in a movie theater, (to learn the business), with a small salary to begin with, and dreams of 'big money' just ahead. But this, like my apprenticeship, soon got wearisome and I found myself looking at the difficulties of the vocation and began looking for something else.

"I then began jumping from one thing to another in rapid succession. Telegraph office, bell hop, railroad ticket office, selling 'hot dogs' and welding the pick and shovel. Giving each one up with a firm conviction that I was bettering myself in the one I was going to, only to find the new one as full of difficulties and hardships as the one I left.

"I used to laugh at The Salvation Army as they sang and marched the streets. I thought they were a joke. 'One night a friend asked me to go to their hall with him, I laughed at him, but went along, just to see what they do.'

"They sang some songs and some got up and talked a little and then the leader of the meeting read the Bible and began to talk. The minute she began to talk I began to feel uncomfortable. 'The more she talked the worse I felt. When she began I thought she must be talking about me. The longer she talked the more sure I got that it was me she was talking about. I wanted to get up and go out, but I was hemmed in on both sides and about two-thirds of the way toward the front of the hall.

"She knew human nature so well that she told me the best history of my past I have ever heard, and my future also, if I didn't change my ways. I began to feel like I had a piece of fat bacon in my throat that wouldn't come up or go down, I tried to swallow the thing, but it stayed right there. Then I felt worse than ever. My eyes got watery and in spite of the effort I made to resist, they just filled up and ran over.

"Someone came from the platform straight for me. 'They wanted me to go up front and get 'saved.' I wouldn't go. They pleaded. I said NO, and after several NO's, I got up and went out. I started home. I don't know where my friend went to go when he went. I had gone about a block down the street when something got hold of me inside. I stopped. I don't remember what thoughts I had or what happened until I got back to the hall. 'We had a prayer meeting. The first time in my life I ever prayed.

"I promised God that I would
