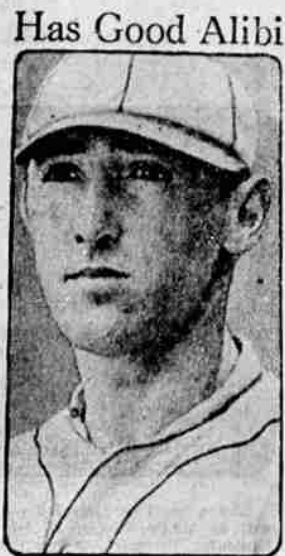
NEGRO BOXER ADOPTS TWO FIGHTING NAMES
