Industrials Are Leading Surge in Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP)—The recovery in stock prices continued today with the industrials in the forefront of the advance. Rails also did better, but with the exception of Canadian Pacific, which moved up over three points to the highest price since 1919, the gains in that group were moderate in character.

Houston Oil was run up over four points to 72 1/2, the highest price in over 10 years. U. S. Steel Iron Pipe extended its early gain to more than five points and sharp gains also were recorded by American Power and Light, American Ice, United Drug, International Business Machines, DuPont, Chicago Pneumatic Tool, Union Carbide and Gotham Silk Hosiery.

The closing was strong. More general buying of oils and low priced rails occurred in the last hour of trading particularly in Erie, New Haven and Atlantic Refining. A number of high priced specialties increased their gains substantially. Total sales approximated 1,250,000 shares.
