**BUTTER ADVANCE IN MARKET HALTS**

No Change in Fresh Egg Prices Today—Sugar Drops Again

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1 (AP)—The advance in cube butter has apparently been halted for the time being. Receipts are picking up and values are fractionally lower for the day. On the dairy exchange extras and prime firsts are a half cent lower at 45 cents. Standard cubes are off a cent at 45 cents.

Today's reaction followed lower prices in the south with both San Francisco and Los Angeles markets displaying an easier tone. Receipts of surplus cubes from the country yesterday amounted to 12,195 pounds, while the make of local creameries was reported at 14,625 pounds.

No change was made in fresh egg prices for the day. Receipts were not so heavy. On the dairy exchange extras are still posted at 25 cents, firsts 27 cents, mediums and current receipts 25 cents. Another decline has been announced in sugar prices by local jobbers. Effective at once all grades are 10 cents lower with cane at \$6.50 and beet at \$6.50 a sack. The drop followed a similar reduction in the refinery list.

**Tunney May Speak For Boxing Bill**

SPOKANE, Feb. 1 (AP)—Gene Tunney, world's heavyweight boxing champion, announced here today that he will be glad to appear before the Washington state legislature next week if invited, to speak for a boxing bill introduced by Representative Lester P. Edges of this city. Tunney is here on a vaudeville tour. He will be in Seattle next and said he could "run down" to the capital by auto or airplane. From the stage of a theater here last night Tunney made public acknowledgment of the faith imposed in him by a Spokane boy who bought a ticket with the money he won on the Tunney-Hennessy championship fight. On the fly leaf of the bible, the boy inscribed "To Harvey Macklin, from Gene Tunney." The champion declared his intention of giving Harvey another bible inscribed by himself.

**Wall Street in Grip of Bullish Operators Today**

NEW YORK, Feb. 1 (By the Associated Press).—Revival of activities and strength in oil shares and a resumption of bullish operations in so-called "merger rate" divided chief speculative interest in today's rising stock market.

Wheeler and Lake Erie preferred was the sensational individual performer, soaring nearly 11 points to 7 1/4, a new high record price since reorganization of the road in 1916 and nearly 20 points above the low level of last month. Western Maryland common and second preferred jumped about 5 points each to new peak prices. Other rails also displayed a strong undertone.

The closing was firm. More aggressive buying of the oil shares. Producers and Refiners preferred rising three points and General Asphalt preferred five, afforded an opportunity for realizing in some of the motors and equipments. Western Maryland issues extended their advances to over seven points. Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.

The flood was caused by backing of water of a creek that flows through MacLay park. A wall of the gulch loosened by the rain slid into the bed of the creek, causing the obstruction that backed up the waters. Pressure of the water broke through the loose earth, causing the flood.

The flood also swept into the plant of the Multnomah Iron Works.
