## Clubwomen Hear MacDowell Music Program Tuesday

One of the best MacDowell programs ever heard in La Grande was given yesterday afternoon at the regular meeting of the Neighborhood club, with Mrs. E. L. Holmes as program chairman, members report.

Mrs. Holmes introduced the Rev. Oliver Riley as the afternoon's speaker, announcing his subject as "Music in General and MacDowell in Particular."

Mr. Riley was at one time a pupil in England and is a talented musician. He told of the development of music from primitive man, through erudite stages, the early church music and the golden age of music to the present day.

Mrs. Riley has a history of development. He told the clubwomen, and it will develop still more, probably to heights never dreamed of.

He described the romantic school, of which Edward L. MacDowell was a representative, telling how the artists of the romantic school expressed their own feelings in their music, not words.

Mr. Riley said that MacDowell was the greatest memorial person who had ever lived.

After briefly reviewing MacDowell's life, Mr. Riley told of the MacDowell club, which he described as the greatest memorial person who had ever lived.

Before introducing the musicians to take part in the program he told that it required three persons to make music—someone to create it, the artist to present it, and someone to appreciate it. He then introduced Mrs. G. S. Birnie and gave a brief description of her number.

Mrs. Birnie sang MacDowell's "The Sea" and "In the Woods," accompanied by Mrs. E. L. Holmes at the piano. Mrs. R. J. Green was the next on the program and she played "To a Waterfall," "Shadow Dances," and "The Eagle."

Preceding her last number she gave a short explanation of the piece.

A trio from the Neighborhood club next, Mrs. James McNamee, Mrs. A. L. Stoddard and Mrs. Verne Ainsworth sang two numbers, "The Beaming Eyes" and "To a Wild Rose," accompanied by Mrs. Holmes at the piano.

As a final number Miss Barbara Hiatt played "The Witches Dance."

Preceding the program the regular business session of the club was held, presided over by Mrs. Robert S. Eakin, the club president.

Mrs. Carl Helm, chairman of the public welfare committee, told of preliminary steps taken toward better motion pictures. She told of the cooperation of the parent-teacher associations and the motion picture managers in this work.

The clubwomen voted to subscribe to the National Motion Picture League, which lists all of the best pictures and gives other interesting details.

## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Baked winter pears, honey porridge, thin cream, broiled salt mackerel, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Oyster ramikins, toasted muffins, radishes, macaroni, steamed corn pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Chicken en casserole, mashed potatoes, corn croquettes, cross and orange salad, whole wheat bread, date and nut pudding, milk, coffee.

The woman who does her own marketing often discovers out-of-season treats at a nominal price. The radishes in the luncheon menu are suggested with this idea in mind.

Stewed Cocoa Pudding

One cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup cocoa, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup chopped dates, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder, sugar and cocoa. Beat yolk of egg until light, gradually beating in milk. Add to dry ingredients with butter which has been softened. Beat mixture well and stir in dates. Add white of egg beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered mold, cover with heavy buttered paper and steam for 1 1/2 hours. Serve with whipped cream or hard sauce flavored with orange.
