MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, ham toast, creamed potatoes, graham muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Parsnip chowder, cauliflower, lettuce and cream cheese sandwiches, apple snow, molasses. DINNER—Italian stew, baked potatoes, creamed carrots, cabbage-celery-pineapple salad, Boston cream pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

"Threads" of pimento are added to the dinner salad to give a bit of color. A French dressing made with lemon juice and without mustard is the perfect dressing for the combination of vegetables and fruit.

Parsnip Chowder One slice salt pork, 1 small onion, 2 cups sliced parsnips, 1 cup sliced potatoes, 2 cups boiling water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 cups hot milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 large soda crackers.

Remove rind from salt pork and cut in small pieces. Fry out fat in soup kettle, add onion cut in thin slices and simmer five minutes. Scrape and slice parsnips and pars and slice potatoes. Add to onion and pork, pour over boiling water and simmer until vegetables are tender. It will take from 20 to 30 minutes. Add salt, pepper, milk and butter and bring to the boiling point. Split crackers and place in a hot serving dish. Pour over chowder and serve.

Some people prefer to dice the vegetables instead of slicing them. Bacon can be used in place of salt pork. (Copyright, 1927, NFA Service, Inc.)

IOWA WOMEN'S CLUBS HAVE 40,000 MEMBERS

Mrs. Albert Rochelle, first woman member of the Wyoming legislature in 12 years, is an ardent advocate of equal suffrage. Twenty years ago when she was living in Leon, Iowa, school board in Colorado and another in Wyoming offered her employment as a teacher. She went to Wyoming because it had given women the right to vote. But four other women have been elected to the house of representatives in Wyoming. Mrs. Rochelle is the mother of four sons and two daughters, and has not permitted her outside activities to interfere with her home.
