ONE-MAN STREET CARS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3 (AP)—One-man street car operation on all lines in the city after 7 p. m. week days and all day Sunday, will be established by the Portland Electric Power company as rapidly as possible. The announcement was made today by the company. The change is already under way, but will take six to nine months to be completed throughout the system. Employees will be absorbed into other departments as the change is made, and the number of street cars in operation will be slightly increased.
