PHIL ROSENBERG TO DEFEND TITLE

Bantamweight Champion Will Fight Bussey Graham This Evening

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—Charles (Toby) Rosenberg today defended his world's bantamweight ring crown for the first time in a titular match here in a year and a half. He will fight Bussey Graham, of Utica, N. Y., in Madison Square Garden tonight at 10 o'clock.

Rosenberg has had a six weeks' fight against weight to reach the class limit of 118 pounds. He still carried an excess three-quarters of a pound as he left the training room yesterday and he had to make the weight this afternoon or see his title forfeited with a \$2,500 guarantee that he would be within the limit. The bout starts at 10 o'clock.

Slight Favorite
Rosenberg, an oft-suspended champion because of his refusal to defend his title, was a slight favorite in speculation but critics conceded Graham a strong chance to lift the crown. For a year Graham has been regarded as the outstanding challenger by the state athletic commission.

Rosenberg is not recognized as champion in some states. Illinois regards Bud Taylor as world title holder.
