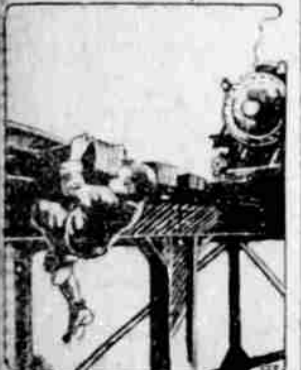
Washington Girls Challenge Sextets

YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 19 Income includes gains realized by the sale of a single piece of property as well as from sales by a person engaged in buying and selling as a business. Ordinarily, gain or loss resulting from the sale of property acquired by purchase after February 28, 1913—the first income tax law applying to individual income—became effective March 1, 1913—is the difference between the cost and the selling price. The gain is income for the year in which received, and can not be prorated through a number of years. For example, a taxpayer bought in 1913 a piece of real estate for \$5,000, which he sold in 1924 for \$7,000. The \$2,000 profit is taxable income for the year 1924. Profit accrued on individual income before March 1, 1913, is not taxable, even though it was not realized until after that date. The reason is that the constitutional amendment authorizing Congress to tax the income of individuals did not become effective until March 1, 1913. The revenue act of 1926 provides that the basis for determining the gain or loss from the sale or other disposition of property acquired by purchase before March 1, 1913, shall be the fair market value as of March 1, 1913, which may be greater. For example, a taxpayer bought in 1913 property for which he paid \$10,000. The value on March 1, 1913, was \$12,000. He sold it in 1924 for \$14,000. The March 1, 1913, value being greater than the cost of the property, the taxable gain is figured on that basis, and amounts to \$2,000. A taxpayer bought in 1913 property for which he paid \$5,000. Its value on March 1, 1913, was \$5,000, and in 1924 he sold it for \$4,000. In this example the taxpayer loses his loss on the March 1, 1913, value, which was greater than the cost, and the deductible loss is \$1,000.

YALE MAY USE SHELL FOR ANOTHER CONTEST

Yale had used the same fragile shell twice in the annual boat race with Harvard on the Thames river, and probably will use it again in June. The shell is 48 feet, 31 inches long and has an anchorage beam of 2 1/4 inches. The hull planking of Spanish cedar is only one-eighth of an inch thick, but it carries the weight of eight men easily. The shell's builder, Richard Pocock, who came to Yale from the University of Washington with Coach Ed Leader, believes the boat could weather rough water that would sink almost any other style of shell.

Although Oregon and California winners of the northern and southern sections of the Pacific coast basketball conference in 1926 are heavy favorites to repeat, neither appears a cinch. In the north the Webfoots have lost only one game, as have Washington and the Oregon Aggies. But the Huskies are yet to take the lead, and so are the Aggies, whereas Oregon already has taken her annual trip away from home and won three out of four of her road games.

The Webfoots have four more games to play, three of them at home. Their only game away from home court will be against the Aggies Friday night at Corvallis. Bears to Meet Redskins.

California has yet to meet Stanford in its three-game series and has two more contests with the Trojans at Los Angeles, Friday and Saturday. Stanford concluded her series with Southern California Saturday night, making a clean sweep in three games.

Three important mistakes are on this week's schedule. The Oregon-O. A. contest, the Washington-Washington state game at Pullman, and the Washington-Idaho game at Moscow. It will be the Huskies first game on their road trip and to remain the running shoe must beat not only the Cougars, but Idaho, which defeated Oregon at Moscow last week, on the Vandals' own court. Also they must meet and win from the Aggies and the Webfoots at Corvallis and Eugene, making her task not at all encouraging.

There were no upsets in last week's play. Montana, as was expected, lost all three of her road games, to Washington, 46 to 17; to Oregon, 54 to 21; and to the Aggies 43 to 20. The Huskies practically eliminated the Cougars from championship aspirations by winning them at Seattle Saturday night, 28 to 16.

Stanford won both games from South California, 24 to 13, and 35 to 24. California did not remain idle, playing three non-conference games, winning three of the Olympic state 24 to 24, and from Nevada, 22 to 17, and 28 to 28.

CARDINALS PIN HOPES ON BIG LESTER BELL

PORTUGAL REBEL MOVE SPREADING

Revolution Bursts Out in Lisbon After Starting in Oporto

By the Associated Press The revolution in Portugal is spreading. This fact stood out clearly today through a maze of fragmentary and delayed dispatches, bearing evidence of the in the capital.

It became known through an Associated Press dispatch from Lisbon, timed 2:15 p. m. saying that a movement in support of the Oporto revolt had broken out in the capital.

Oporto, second city in the country in point of population, was the starting place of the insurrection which began last Thursday with the avowed object of overthrowing President Carmona's dictatorship and reestablishing a parliamentary form of government.

Civilians Fleeing

The Oporto rebels, headed by General Sampaio, are still holding out in the face of intense artillery fire and the hurried approach of government reinforcements. Fleeing started in the city by exploding shells are spreading and the civilian population has fled. Early today announcement was made that the rebels had unconditionally surrendered but this was followed within a few hours by an admission from the minister of war that the conditions of surrender had not been met and that the bombardment was being renewed.

Civilians Join Rebels

LISBON, Portugal, Feb. 7 (AP) 2:30 p. m.—A movement has broken out in Lisbon with the collaboration of public forces and people supporting the Oporto revolt. The Lisbon police are joining the revolutionary militia.
