Bumper Crop of Honey in Vale; 2 Cars Shipped

VALE, Ore., Feb. 9 (AP)—Two cars of comb honey left Vale last week consigned to Oklahoma and Los Angeles markets. The cars were made up of honey produced by practically all Vale bee keepers. The selling price was fair, \$2 a case in advance, and more if retained at a good price. The highest price received for Vale honey this year was \$3 a case, sold to an Indianapolis firm about two months ago.

The honey crop has been unusually good this year, with 3,500 cases of comb honey shipped out of Vale, Brogan and Nysse. The crop was four times as large as that of last year, due to favorable weather, absence of alfalfa weevil and good bloom.

Largest Vale growers are Peterson brothers, C. W. Nelson and James Graham.
