STILL CLIMBINGExtras Reach 46 1/2 Cents
—Eggs Steady—Poul-
try Market WeakPORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 16 (AP).—
Cuba butter prices continue on
the upward trend. All grades with
the exception of prime firsts are
a half cent higher today with ex-
tras now at 46 1/2 cents. Stand-
ards are posted at 45 1/2 cents with
the lower grades at 44 1/2 cents.Fresh eggs remain steady and
unchanged. Receipts, however,
are packing up again and with
other coast cities on the lower
wing, declines are anticipated
here.The local poultry market con-
tinues weak. Light hens are down
to 18 cents with heavy hens hard-
ly holding at the 25-cent top. Few
turkeys coming and prime dressed
birds still bring around 43 cents.Thursday's express arrivals of
country killed meats were light
but the market still has a weak
undertone. Seventeen cents is the
general top on choice, light calves
with an occasional sale at 17 1/2
cents. Choice light hogs at 17
cents.\$12.00 downward; choice lambs
scarce; sheep steady; bulk fat
cows, \$7.50 to \$8.25; fair demand for
feeding and shearing lambs; best
held at \$12.25.

Rails Sluggish
After Outburst;
Equipments Up

NEW YORK, Feb. 16 (AP).—
Speculative operations for the ad-
vance shifted from the rails to the
industrials in today's stock mar-
ket. With public enthusiasm for
the rails temporarily chilled by
yesterday's demoralizing market
in these issues, Baldwin was again
the outstanding feature, reaching
17 1/2, the highest price ever re-
corded. Other railroad equipments
followed the lead of Baldwin.
American Brake Shoe and Foundry
jumping five points and Ameri-
can Locomotive, Lima Locomotive
and American Car and Foundry
climbing two points or more.

Trains were sluggish. Pittsburg
and West Virginia broke six points
and Western Maryland common
and second preferred and Chicago
and Great Western common sold
down three points or more. Wheel-
ing and Lake Erie common was
quiet, but advanced from 30 to 35.
Baldwin extended its advance to
almost 10 points, selling above 17 1/2.
Total sales approximated 1,800,
000 shares.

Low Grade Gold
In Clatsop Area

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 16.—Ore
assaying \$3.20 gold to the ton has
been found in Clatsop county. It is
announced by two Astoria men who
have been devoting themselves for
some time to prospecting for min-
eral deposits in this county.

The ledge from which the ore
was taken will be studied carefully
to determine if the ore could be
worked profitably and if there is
richer quartz in the vicinity.

While \$3.20 ore is best and
could be worked only in very large
quantities the men who made the
find believe that their sample may
be a lead to richer rock which it
may pay to mine.

They have been engaged for
some time in studying various
mineral deposits in the county. It
is known that silver has been
found in the Cannon Beach dis-
trict and Silver Point gained that
name because the sandstone of
which it is composed bears silver.

The discovery of gold, even in
small quantities, in the county is
somewhat new, although early
residents in the Nehalem valley oc-
casionally panned gold from the
sand and gravel deposits along
that river.
