PASS TO BATTER IS NOT POPULAR

Sports Writer Discusses This Much Talked of Phase of Baseball

Every sport has certain phases of play that are unpopular, yet are essential to the success of the game. Without a doubt, the intentional pass is the most despised and most hated play in baseball. The baseball fans of the country have gone on record against it. I have never heard one defend it.

Novel Suggestion
The other day I received a very interesting communication from a football enthusiast by the name of F. Hahn, who may or may not be a Minnesota resident. He suggests that in all football games, a touchdown should not count as a point until the player who has scored has been put to rest.

In view of the disaster in which the point after touchdown is used, I offer the following suggestion, which I believe will prove a better test of team strength.

My suggestion is: after a touch-down has been made, the ball shall be put in play on the 10 yard line. The only condition to be placed under which the touch-down was made, namely, the team in possession of the ball is to have four downs to make the required 10 yards, using any play except the drop or place kick.

Deserves Consideration
My informant received a team from inserting a clause which into this thing for the sole purpose of scoring a drop or place kick.

He argues that four downs would really give the stronger team a fair chance to demonstrate its superiority. Mr. Hahn concludes by asking:

Ferocious Dog Attacks Woman at Wallowa, Ore.

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Feb. 11.—Mrs. Burton Wade was attacked Monday morning by a dog while getting in coal from a woodshed in back of her house in Wallowa. Standing in the doorway of the shed she stepped down to pick up a piece of coal. Under one arm she carried her pet cat.

While she was stooping over, a large collie dog leaped on her, locking her neck and drew and knocking her down. Mrs. Wade leaped at the dog to keep him off and she could remain her feet then striking into the adjoining chicken house she slammed the door shut.

The dog ran around the chicken house a few times and then discovering an opening in the wall, crawled through and attacked Mrs. Wade into the corner and attacked her again, biting her on the head and arm in the side. Her hands were also bitten when she tried to use them to hold the dog off.

Two large parking cases stood in one corner of the building and Mrs. Wade crawled behind these where the dog could not reach her. The sounds on the house were heard and groaned, however, where he had been at them in an effort to reach Mrs. Wade. Behind one of the boxes she found a large dish with which she succeeded in driving the dog away. Rushing to the house she called up Mr. Wade at the Strick-Wade garage but before he could reach home the

dog had disappeared. The animal was killed later and its brain was sent to Portland for analysis to determine whether there was evidence of rabies. No other persons were attacked but, fearing the dog might have bitten other animals, residents of Wallowa have been enjoined to keep their pets locked up or muzzled.

STEEL GOLF CLUBS SEEN
