Local Ministers Praise Actions of Police Chief

Removal of "Art" Magazines from Newsstands Is Given Endorsement by Association.

Coming on the heels of the announcement that Police Chief Clint Haynes had removed certain "art" magazines from three local newsstands, the La Grande Ministerial association through the Rev. George Albert Pollard, president, heartily endorsed his actions.

"Having learned of the action of the police chief, the ministerial association of this city wishes the public to know that such action has its unqualified approval and endorsement," the report read.

"The matter of the wrong kind of literature for sale in our midst has before this time been brought to the attention of the ministers, with the result that there has been some thought and effort taken in the interests of the improvement of the reading matter put before our boys and girls. We believe this to be a matter of solicitude to all parents."

Commend Chief's Action
"Where the offensive literature is so rampant that it comes within the power of the law, it should be dealt with summarily and we wish to commend the action of the chief in this respect. Much that is objectionable, however, still keeps within the law and other means must be sought of handling the problem. It is the disposition of the ministerial association to handle all such matters as naturally occur in a constructive and cooperative way. We recognize the immense harm accomplished by the wrong kind of literature when it falls into the hands of young people, and practical illustrations of this fact are not wanting in La Grande. But we recognize also that the solution of this problem is essentially one of education and must move slowly. Any difficulties are in the way which cannot be brushed aside easily."

Urges Parents to Act
"One thing at least we can do: As parents we can take greater interest in the reading of our children, providing them with books and magazines that are wholesome. Some seem to have the opinion that in the judgement of religious people only those books are good which are religious in nature or point a moral. But the world is full of reading, both books and magazines, that is so intensely interesting as to make its own appeal to red-blooded boys and girls, and yet so far above the common trash that its superiority is instantly seen by anyone. We have a splendid library with able and interested librarians; we have splendid schools with an efficient faculty. I am sure parents or children desiring information as to good reading will have the hearty assistance of these sources, as well as that of the ministers, in selecting reading that will interest and entertain, but in which there is no sting."

Plans are for the beginning of a religious canvass of the city under the auspices of the city ministerial association beginning next week and in preparation for the canvass, the pastors of the various churches are asked to find out tomorrow, Feb. 13, the number of persons their congregation can furnish to work during the canvass.
