

GIANT NEGRO IS UNDER SUSPICION

Grave Robber May Be Toledo Slugger, Is One Theory of Officers

CHICAGO, Feb. 14 (AP).—Theories that James Coyner, giant negro serving a prison sentence in Indiana for grave robbery, may have been the Toledo slugger of women and also may have information about the torso of a woman found near South Bend, Ind., was expressed today by authorities delving into the mystery of four women's skulls found in a trunk at Royal Oak, Mich.

Coyner, who will be questioned by officials from Oakland county, Mich., has acknowledged that the trunk belonged to him, but he denied he knew anything of the skulls. In letters smuggled from prison to his sister in Chicago, Coyner repeatedly asked her to get his trunk and attend to "something else" than his grave robbing conviction, which, if discovered, he said, would make him "through forever."

Clyde Underwood, prosecuting attorney of Oakland county, and chief of police George W. Smith, of Ferndale, Mich., which is the home of the Toledo slugger, said they planned to go to Michigan City, where Coyner is in prison. He was convicted of robbing a gravestone at Hammond, Ind.

Chicago Investigating
Chicago authorities also were investigating a theory that Coyner might have obtained the skulls by grave robbing, or by slaying near Rome, Ill., where he once worked. Detroit authorities intimated they would drop the case unless murder evidence was found.

The theory that Coyner might have been the slugger who attacked and slew or wounded several women at Toledo in the last few months was supported only by his statement to officers who arrested him that he was in Toledo about the time of these assaults, and by the fact that he is six feet, six inches tall. The Toledo terror was called "a giant."

Warden Daly of the Indiana prison has scouted the belief that Coyner is a murderer. His theory is that the negro simply was obsessed with a mania for robbing graves.

Batschelet is slowly recovering in a local hospital from the beating administered to him.

RAIL INNOVATION

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 14 (AP).—The Southern Pacific company is to attempt a traffic innovation on the route from San Francisco to Portland designed especially for those who cannot be bothered with Pullman sleepers.

It is to be an all-coach train with diner and all-day lunch car and will run once a week, starting each Wednesday at 8:40 a. m. The train will arrive in Portland at 11:40 a. m. the following day. 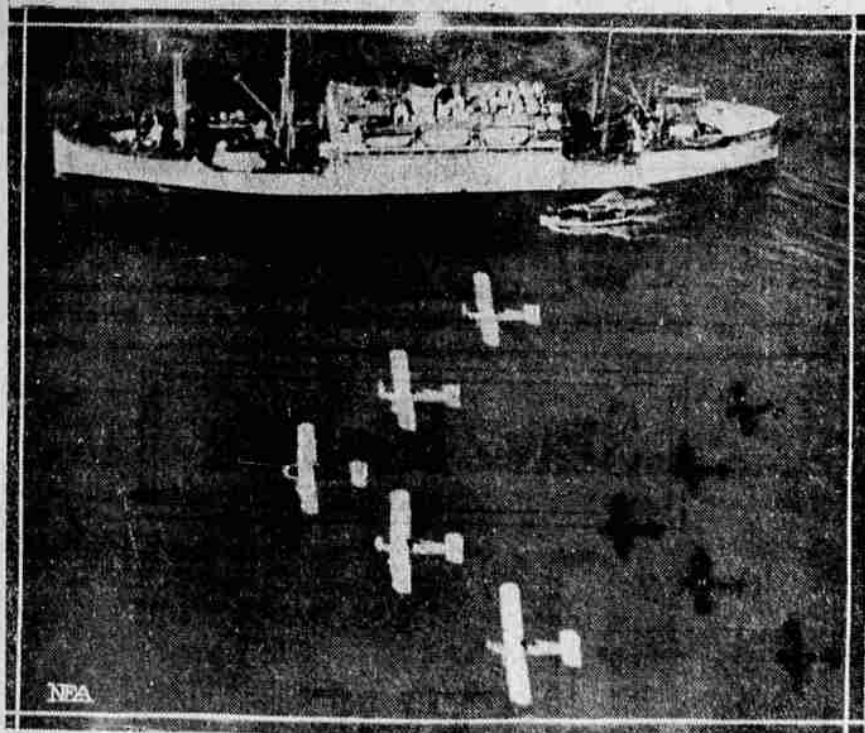
