YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 25

To obtain a deduction for traveling expenses, which form an important item in the returns of many taxpayers, certain regulations must be observed. The taxpayer is required to attach to his return a statement showing the nature of business in which engaged, number of days away from home during the taxable year on account of business, total amount of expenses incidental to meals and lodging while absent from home on business, and total amount of "other expenses incidental to travel and claimed as a deduction." Among the "other expenses" are those which are held to be a part of traveling expenses, provided they are reasonable in amount.

Traveling expenses are deductible only when the trip is on business. They are limited to such expenses as are reasonable and necessary in the conduct of the business and directly attributable to it. Examples are payment for the use of a sample room or the hire of vehicles in visiting customers.

If a person whose business requires him to travel receives a salary as full compensation for his services, without reimbursement for traveling expenses, or is employed on a commission basis with no expense allowance, his traveling expenses, including the entire amount expended for meals and lodging, are deductible from gross income.

If a person receives a salary and is also repaid his actual traveling expenses, he must include in his gross income the amount so repaid, and may deduct such expenses.

Traveling expenses incurred in connection with a journey to another city to accept or seek employment are not deductible. Suburbanites who commute daily from their homes to their places of business are not permitted to deduct the cost of transportation, it being a personal expense. Claims for deductions for traveling expenses must be substantiated, when required by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, by records showing in detail the amount and nature of the expenses incurred.
