Influenza Wave Is Coming West; Europe in Grip

Pandemics of influenza usually have their origin in the East, beginning in Asia and traveling westward until they have encompassed the world. Influenza has been epidemic in Europe for the past three weeks. The epidemic is reported as severe and that pneumonia is a frequent complication. The spread of influenza depends upon two principal conditions—the presence of the infective agent and susceptible individuals. The rate of transmission depends on the proximity of communities and the intimacy of contact between individuals. Influenza is undoubtedly spread through the secretions and discharges from the nose and mouth of persons suffering from influenza, or from those of a carrier, which gain entrance to the respiratory tract of other individuals. Droplet infection may easily occur if susceptible individuals are in close enough proximity to receive the particles given off in sneezing, coughing, talking, laughing, or through any other means whereby they are forcibly expelled from the mouth and nose.

Important to Watch
Objects which have been recently contaminated with discharges from the nose and mouth are important agents in conveying the virus. As in common colds and other respiratory infections an innumerable number of articles may be soiled with influenza discharges. The hands are a frequent means of conveyance, both by the direct and indirect route. It is indeed surprising how often, during the ordinary course of a day, one's hands come in contact with the nose and mouth. It is obviously easy, therefore, to understand the "hand to mouth" infection.

British Awaiting News From China In Anxious Frame

LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—With no official dispatches from China in the last 20 hours, the British government today was anxiously awaiting news of the fate of the critical negotiations at Hankow.

There was a tense moment in the house of commons this afternoon when Philip Snowden, laborer, asked foreign secretary Sir Austen Chamberlain whether the negotiations between the Chinese foreign minister, Eugene Chen, and British Charge d'Affaires Owen O'Malley had broken down as stated in the press.

"Up to the present moment, I have received no information," answered the foreign secretary gravely.

Farm Pointers

Pasture mixtures are sown early for best results by the Oregon experiment station. Sowing best takes place from February 15 to March 1, to get the grass well established before the hot winds of summer. The crops to use in a pasture mixture depend almost entirely on the type of soil. The experiment station has worked out pasture mixtures for various soil types and will send them to anyone on application.

Oregon vegetable gardeners are using plant protectors, principally of the treated paper type, some known as hot caps, in order to forward their vegetables to early maturity. Says the vegetable gardening department of the state college: Their use for tomatoes, peppers and other similar plants as well as for melons, is widening in the northwest. Some growers make their protectors of small glass-covered boxes, but if used on a large scale, these hot caps from the seed houses are more practical.

To save a double-boiler from boiling dry, put a small baking powder can or a jelly glass into the lower part of the boiler. When the water reaches the can it is set in motion and tilts against the bottom of the boiler. It makes a good alarm clock and warns you to add water to the boiler.

If you have put too much salt in the meat stew or soup, add a raw potato, which as it cooks will absorb some of the extra salt.

Barley will keep fresh several days if it is washed in cold water, placed in a glass jar with a tight cover and put in the icebox.

Transfer all small package goods, such as soda, baking powder, ginger and mustard into empty glass jars, and your shelves will be neater. Also you can tell at a glance how large your stock is. Adhesive tape may be used for the labels. Cover the labels with colored shellac and the jars may be washed without harming the label.

Truck Tire Bill Loses
House bill 485, which would legislate solid tire trucks off the roads of Oregon after Jan. 1, 1930, was among those ground out at the session of the lower house last night. The bill provides that only pneumatic tired trucks may be on the roads after the next two years, until which Senator Joseph, of Portland, introduced to tide the state over its present deficit period, by permitting the state to borrow funds from the accident commission and the highway commission, passed the senate late yesterday.

The senate passed a house bill increasing from \$3,000 to \$3,600 the salary of the governor's secretary, the assistant secretary of state, the assistant state treasurer, and the secretary of the state tax commission.

A senate bill proposing pensions for firemen and policemen was defeated by one vote.

The attempt of a group in the house to override the vote of the people last November against fish wheels on the upper Columbia ended in failure yesterday afternoon, when house bill 354 was killed by a vote of 44 to 14.

Representative A. S. Roberts, of the Dalles, was author of the bill.

quences of a heavy battle in or near Matagalpa called for protection. Dennis advised them to barricade themselves in their homes and await developments.

In the disturbance which followed the departure of the conservatives from Matagalpa, the liberals raged about the streets firing their guns indiscriminately. They killed the jailer of the Central prison and released 150 prisoners who joined the revolt.

Secretary Wilbur has announced that United States forces in Nicaragua consist of 150 officers and 300 enlisted men, including 50 of the corps, five cruisers, five destroyers and one mine sweeper are in Nicaraguan waters.

Neutral zones have been established by the American forces at Bluefields, Pearl Lagoon, Rio Grande, Prinzapolca, Puerto Cabezas and Rama.
