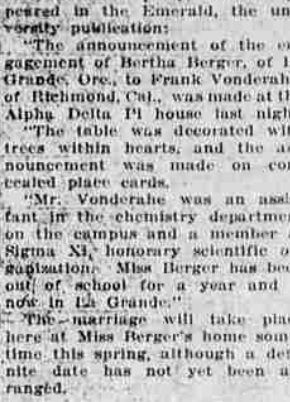

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Cereal cooked with raisins, thin cream, apple sauce, country sausage, buckwheat pan cakes, sirup, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Tomatoes a la king, hot buttered toast, celery hearts, ring of prunes with whipped cream, milk, tea.
DINNER—Roast chicken, brown gravy, mashed potatoes, corn soufflé, salad chiffonade, vanilla ice cream with caramel sauce, mock angel food cake, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

Tomatoes a la king are out of the ordinary and very good. They offer a suggestion for your evening bridge club supper.

Tomatoes a la King
One-half pound fresh mushrooms, 3 hard cooked eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 canned plum, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 ripe tomatoes, 6 squares toast.

Peel and slice mushrooms. Melt 1 tablespoon butter, add mushrooms, sprinkle with salt and cook covered for 15 minutes. In the meantime melt remaining butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add to mushrooms. Add eggs cut in slices, plum cut in thin strips, salt and pepper. Heat over hot water. Pare tomatoes and cut in thin slices. Dip each slice in a well seasoned French dressing. Put a slice of tomato on each piece of toast, pour over sauce and serve at once. Garnish with a sprig of parsley or water-cress.

ANTIQUARIAN ANTI-RHINUM IS THE OLD FASHIONED SNAPDRAGON

Since the old-fashioned snapdragon became a popular garden flower plant it is becoming quite widely known by its botanical name, due to the fact that florists use it in their shops in offering the blooms for sale. The word is pronounced anti-rhi-num, or anti-RE-num, the "r" long, depending upon whether you were brought up to use the Roman or classical method of pronouncing Latin. Most members of the trade do neither, but call it anti-RINN-um, the "r" short. But, anyhow, it is nothing but the old-fashioned snapdragon in more splendid guise than of yore, and one of the finest plants either for the garden or the greenhouse that we have.

We have it in four stages—dwarf, semi-dwarf, tall and super-

tall. The last, known as anti-rhinum majus maximum, greater greatest, to translate, is the giant of the tribe both in height, size of bloom and length of spike. Snapdragons, sown in the open ground in May, will show their first blooms in July and increase in beauty until cut down by killing frosts. They will survive ordinary frosts.

The semi-dwarf or intermediate type is the most successful for the garden because of its greater freedom of bloom, being more inclined

to branch than the tall forms which shoot up to one tremendous spike which will be followed by numerous side branches later. The tall varieties which grow from 3 to 5 feet in height often require staking. The intermediates reaching a height of about 18 inches do not. The dwarfs make fine edgings or beds.

Snapdragons might well be started early in the house to give them a longer blooming season. The seeds should be kept in a cool place. The seedlings will not make

much leaf growth, but they will be stocky and will do better when transplanted into the open than the taller plants from seed grown in heat. Cold frame plants are usually very successful.

It is best to plant in groups of one color. The seeds come about 80 per cent true. The pinks are favorite, with the yellows and flame colored next in demand. There is a wonderful variety of coloring from which to select.

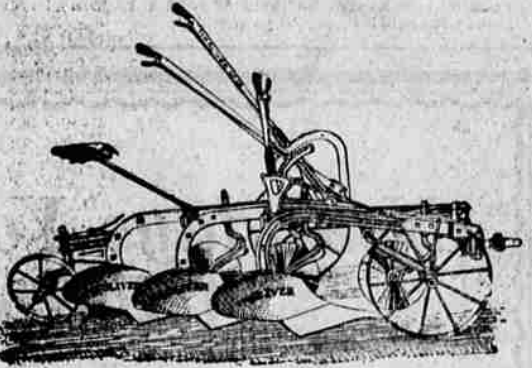

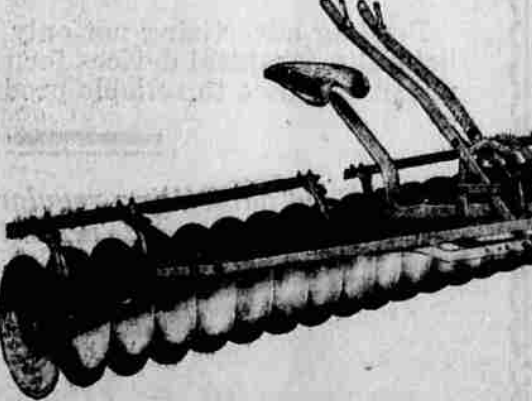

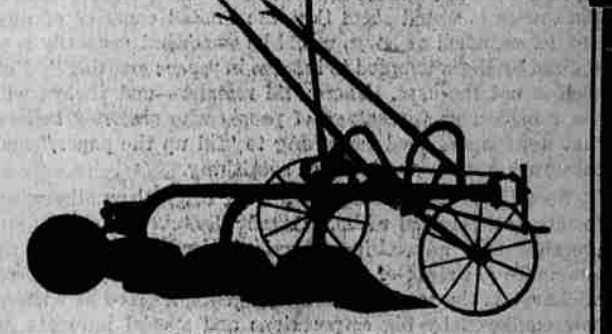
