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RELIGIOUS CLASS WORK IS PLANNED

Ministers and Churchmen Expect to Open School During April

The ministers and 30 representatives from the nine protestant churches of the city met at the First Baptist church last evening, the purpose of the meeting being to discuss the advisability of conducting a religious education training course here.

The Rev. G. A. Pollard, president of the ministerial association, presided over the meeting, and introduced Mrs. Jean M. Johnson, executive secretary of the Oregon Council of Religious Education, who talked on "Trained Leadership," and outlined the course of study to be followed.

Her outline included the study of the pupil, principals of education, Bible study, the old and new testaments, the message and program of church religion and the teaching task of the church. These subjects are included in the A group of the course, the B group offers specialization courses and the C group elective courses. Twelve credits compose the standard course, and four are required for specialization.

Begin Course in April
It was decided to begin the course the Monday following Easter Sunday, April 17, or the following Monday, April 25, the place to be decided later. The course to be given here will include the first three topics in the A group, after which the specialization course will be taken up.

Plans were made for Mrs. Johnson to make an effort to secure Dr. Andrews, director of religious education for the First Methodist Episcopal church, of Portland, who will act as dean of the school. An effort will also be made to obtain Mrs. Essens, of the First Presbyterian church, to have charge of the specialization work. Mrs. H. W. Parker, wife of the First M. E. pastor here, was elected registrar for the school.

Appoint Three
The administration board for the school will be composed of one member from each of the churches, the members of the board to be named Monday at a meeting of the ministerial association.

Three local persons, the Rev. Oliver Riley, the Rev. H. K. Wallis, and Mrs. Lief H. Aves, have already been appointed to the faculty.

San Diego Smiling
SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 17, (AP).—Recovering from isolation from the rest of the world, San Diego today smiling is contemplating a water system that withstood the strain of the most severe flood in more than 20 years, and now containing enough water to supply the city's normal needs for a decade. Flood waters receded rapidly.

Although the city is still without rail or motor transportation with the outside world work crews began repairing the damage to the highways and roadbeds, and it is expected that train service will be resumed tomorrow. Telephone and telegraph service was restored last night. Transportation is functioning normally.

son company there, causing the greatest tragedy of the storm. Twenty-four persons caught in the slide still are in hospitals, many of them seriously injured.

Besides San Diego and Los Angeles, the badly flooded cities include Long Beach, where some 2,500 persons were driven from their homes by high water. 64 city blocks having been flooded; Venice, where six hundred or more were forced to flee; Anaheim, with 20 blocks inundated, and Fullerton, where 40 blocks were under water.

At Anaheim an oil tank, undermined by flood waters toppled over and added its 50,000 barrels of petroleum to the flood, covering the surface of the water with a greasy mixture. At Escondido, one of the show places of San Diego county 6.62 inches of rain fell Tuesday night and early Wednesday.

New Storm Expected
While some of the rivers and creeks were reported receding and the flood crest passing, weather reports said another storm of unknown proportions was rolling in from the Pacific. More rain today also was promised. The Pacific storm was reported to be 48 hours away.

Traffic in the southland was completely paralyzed for a time, but limited train service was resumed at Los Angeles toward the east last night.

The death list included one drowning at San Diego, four from traffic accidents in Los Angeles, one death at Taft, one at Riverside, and one in the train wreck at Whittier. In several of the cities the water reached a depth of three to six feet. Some places in the Mission valley of San Diego county were reported to have been under 10 feet of water.

Additional cities deluged by flood waters were Cuna park, a Los Angeles suburb which at one time was under three feet of water; Greenville, which was submerged and evacuated, and Laurel Canyon, some of whose residents fled because of fear of a landslide.

Cantonese Army Pressing Back Northern Troops

Hanchow, 113 miles from Shanghai and key city of Chekiang province, became the center of the civil war in China today, the Cantonese, or nationalists, claiming its capture and other advances indicating its imminent downfall.

The northern army of Sun Chuan-fang, defending Hanchow, appeared to have collapsed but whether to such a degree as to leave Shanghai open to a Cantonese attack was uncertain.

News from the province of Honan said that the northern armies of Marshal Chang Tsao-lin and his ally general, Chang Tsai-chang continued their advance on the Cantonese-controlled upper Yangtze valley.

Chieftains of the northern alliance continued their conferences at Peking regarding the Honan campaign.

The league of nations at Geneva acknowledged receipt of Peking's communication demanding withdrawal of the British troops en route to Shanghai. The British press is apparently little impressed by the demand.

The demand of the Cantonese foreign minister, Eugene Chen, that he be recognized as the official spokesman for all of China and that the entire concession problem be settled at Hanchow caused the present suspension of negotiations there, official advisers to London say.
