MENUS

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Spaghetti en casserole, radishes, bean muffins stewed, stuffed figs, milk, tea.

DINNER—Cream of celery soup, broiled lamb chops, twice baked potatoes, Brussels sprouts in cheese sauce, grapefruit-cherry and Brazil nut salad, baked date and nut pudding, Graham rolls, milk, coffee.

A fruit salad is always delicious served with a French dressing and if it's a dinner salad after a heavy meat course the French dressing is imperative. However, if the meat course is light as in the menu suggested, or if a fruit salad is chosen for luncheon the dressing may be a real mayonnaise or a rich boiled dressing made tart with lemon juice in place of vinegar.

Spaghetti en Casserole
One cup spaghetti, 4 tablespoons chopped fat salt pork, 1 medium-sized carrot, 1 medium-sized onion, 2 large blades celery, 1 sweet pepper, 1/2 pound or about 4 mushrooms, 1/2 pound round steak, 1 cup canned tomato rubbed through a sieve, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 2 tablespoons sifted dried bread crumbs.

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water for 20 minutes. Drain and rinse in cold water. Put one-half of the spaghetti into a well-buttered casserole. Put chopped salt pork into a hot frying pan and cook, stirring with a fork, until the fat cooks out and bits of meat begin to brown. Do not let the pork cook too fast. Scrape carrot, peel onion, wash celery, remove seeds from pepper and peel mushrooms.

The Garden

TO SUCCEED WITH FLOWERS
CHOOSE PLANTS TO FIT SOIL
The character of the soil in the flower garden will determine to a large extent the success or failure of certain annuals. Those which like a rich heavy soil will not do as well in light sandy soil. Some that like the lighter medium will do better than when in heavy soil. Some will not flourish if there is not enough lime in the soil, but are not particular as to texture.

Ten weeks stocks often refuse to do anything but form big bunches of leaves when there is a lack of lime. Annual larkspur like plenty of lime. When it comes to growing annuals that like a rich diet in light soil the gardener has some problem ahead. Often it can be solved by frequent watering. Drainage is useful, and this light soil usually have to an altogether uncomfortable degree. Growing plants in a sandy soil will require careful attention to watering. The light soil may be plenty rich enough, but capricious moisture is necessary to liberate plant food.

The main task with light soil is to add humus yearly in the shape of stable manure or compost. Now that we have chemicals available for making synthetic manure in a hurry from straw, autumn leaves and grass clippings, this problem is greatly simplified, and we can make soil to suit with less difficulty than ever before. The humus adds a moisture-retaining medium to light soils that is greatly needed.

It is even more necessary in clay soils. Many gardens have to struggle with this type of soil. It usually grows fine flowers, but is hard to work. Add compost or

stable manure each year until it is well mingled with the clay, when it forms an ideal soil medium. Compost is more effective in loosening up clay than trying to break it with sand. Clay soils are at their worst when they back into bricklike consistency during periods of summer drought. They are difficult to water, because the moisture doesn't penetrate easily. Start a compost heap this spring.

If you have clay soil, and prepare to break it up.
