2 SOUTHERN STATES HIT BY TORNADO

The Colorado river above Yuma, and added to the already swollen volume, was expected to make a flow of 75,000 second feet over the high peak of the flood which broke through the Imperial valley levees last June.

Railways Required
Although rail communication with few exceptions had been restored, highway traffic continued in a snarl as crews of workmen set out to repair roads, rebuild bridges and remove landslides.

Transcontinental trains of the Southern Pacific were still being rerouted over the Santa Fe tracks. Other roads were operating on almost regular schedules.

San Diego, which has been isolated since Wednesday, remained cut off from rail and highway communication. Passenger and freight traffic is being carried by coastwise steamers.

Hemet Lake and San Jacinto, in this San Jacinto valley, last night were isolated by a stretch of flood water which inundated bottom lands.

Dam Withstands Pressure
Hemet Lake dam, on the south fork of the San Jacinto river is still standing although holding the heaviest load of water in its history. The dam was believed for a time to have gone out. The San Jacinto river has overflowed its banks, for many miles inundating farm lands east of Riverside.

Reports of the flood situation received last night stated the entire San Pasquale valley, east of Escondido, was flooded and that many names washed out.

Palm Springs Damaged
Palm Springs suffered heavy damage to property when torrential streams carried away several small houses and undamaged homes. Bridges on both sides of the town were washed out, leaving the community completely isolated.

Newport Beach was temporarily cut off when the Santa Ana river charged through a new channel between there and Huntington beach carrying with it about 150 feet of highway and 1000 feet of Pacific electric railway tracks.

Two Fined For Having Deer in Their Possession

F. R. Lee was fined \$100 and Harley Smith \$50 yesterday afternoon when they were arraigned before Judge U. G. Couch in the county court and pleaded guilty to a charge of illegal possession of deer meat.

The two were arrested Wednesday night when on their way to La Grande from the Starkey vicinity, where Lee claimed he had been for several days, calling Smith to come along with him that evening.

Sheriff Jess Breshears, his deputy Hinko Klinghamer, and Harold Howard were on their way to La Grande with three prisoners arrested in a raid on a cabin along Heaver creek, when they noticed Smith's coupe stuck in the snow. They helped them to get started and everything went along all right until they became stuck the second time and Klinghamer, suspecting something he said, lifted the lid at the back of the car and found two dressed deer.

The sheriff turned the case over to the game warden upon reaching La Grande and the two were arraigned yesterday. Lee said that he killed the deer, and Smith declared he did not know what was in the car.

Both men paid their fines.

Followers of track and field events will again cast their eyes toward the middle west this season to watch John Kuck, the blonde boy from Kansas State Teachers' college at Emporia. Kuck made two world records last year and was a javelin thrower on the All-American track and field team. In his third year at the Teachers' college, Kuck is expected to go after the 15 pound shot put record to add to the eight and 12 pound records he holds.

He is entered in the Kansas City Athletic club meet February 19 and is expected to make it hard for contenders at the Kansas and Drake relays later on. He is said to have started practice at the age of 11 with a clapper from an old dinner bell at his home at Wilson, Kas.

Mrs. Wright Will Take Her Hubby Back, She Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18 (AP)—The Examiner says Mrs. Miriam Noel Wright, who came here several months ago after having played an exciting part as the injured wife in a triangle involving her husband, Frank Lloyd Wright, noted architect, and Miss Olga Milanoff, Montenegrin dancer, is ready to take back her husband or give him a divorce providing he will not marry the dancer.

Wright was arrested last summer on a Mann act charge after his wife had cooperated with federal officers in searching his country estate Tallieson, at Spring Green, Wis. The case is still pending in federal court at Minneapolis.

"If he will give up this woman, this Olga Milanoff, then I will take him back," Mrs. Wright is quoted as saying. "I will make some sacrifice to save him from prison. If he is ready to make some sacrifice, so am I. He has done to me everything he can do to a woman, abandoned me, starved me, persecuted me."

the first trial of Daugherty and Miller. His answers were given in a weak voice. But today he used the witness chair as a diaphragm which he told the world that Harry M. Daugherty, "never once spoke to me about those claims, directly or indirectly."

"Did Jess Smith ever speak to you about them?" he was asked. "No," came his vociferous reply. "Jess Smith never spoke to me. I venture to say that if he had I would have ordered him out of my office."

"I want to take this occasion to tell the court, this jury and the world that neither Daugherty or Miller or Smith ever spoke to me of these claims, and if they or any one else had, it would have done them no good."
