

FISHING FLEETS HEAD TO NORTH

Annual Race to Alaska
Halibut and Salmon
Banks Under Way

SEATTLE, Feb. 18 (AP)—The annual race to the Alaska halibut and salmon banks has begun and the winged fleets of the fisherman are standing out to sea.

The boats winter here and the fishermen put in the cold winter months mending their nets and overhauling their equipment. Most of the vessels are auxiliary schooners, nowadays, but gas engines and steam have not driven away the sailing ships entirely and almost the entire fleet is navigated much of the time under canvas.

Midnight February 15 signalled the opening of the halibut season. The annual exodus to northern waters begins each year about 10 days before the opening date.

A battle for strategic positions adds thrills to the race of the smaller vessels, and sudden storms, sweeping down from the Arctic, often drive the boats to sheltering coasts and harbors.

More than six million dollars worth of halibut was landed in Alaska, British Columbia and Puget Sound last year, with 250 boats taking part.

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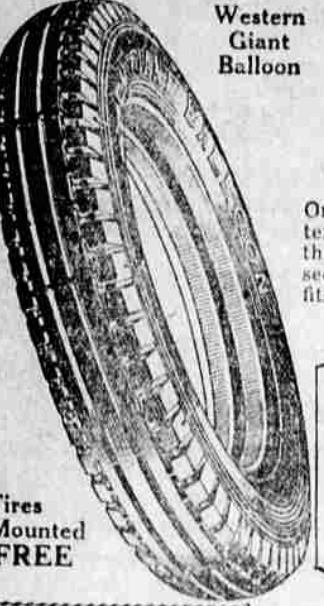
