WOOL REPORT

HOUSTON, Feb. 18 (AP).—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The eastern seaboard wool markets have been quiet since the week on the whole. Medium washed wools have been in best request, with prices fully firm. The attention is now awaiting the goods market, with light weight orders in many instances finding their orders running out while the heavyweight lines are developing cautiously."

"In the west contracting on the sheep's back has gone on apace and probably close to 50 million pounds of wool have been taken already, with prices again slightly advanced the buyer and very close up to the eastern market port. The foreign markets are buoyant and if anything dearer. Mohair is moderately active with prices fairly steady. The Commercial Bulletin will print the following wool quotations tomorrow: Soured wools—Oregon; North, 1.10 to 1.15; fine and P. M. clothing, 1.10 to 1.15.

Rail Shares in Upward Trend in Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (AP).—Speculation for the advance which has been conducted at a rather brisk pace this week, particularly in the railroad shares, slowed down today as a result of rather heavy work and training. An opening outburst of strength resulted in a sharp rise and a few specialties being elevated to new high levels for the year, but many of the gains were reduced in a later selling movement. By early afternoon prices were headed upward again.

Delaware and Hudson climbed 1 1/2 to the highest price since 1919 while Western common, another Love issue, was pushed up to around 7 1/2 a share, new peak for 10 1/2. Lehigh Valley also reached new high ground. Heavily new dropped out in some of the stocks while Southern Railway, an issue, International Harvester and Remington Typewriter yielded two to three points on the appearance of the selling pressure. The closing was firm. Railroad shares continued to be more responsive than industrials to bullish sentiment in the later dealings. Lacked, Gas advanced four points. Chesapeake and Ohio gained five points. Pittsburg and West Virginia, American, Western preferred and Case Trucking were down around four points. Wheeling and Lake Erie preferred jumped 6 1/2. Total sales approximated 1,300,000 shares.

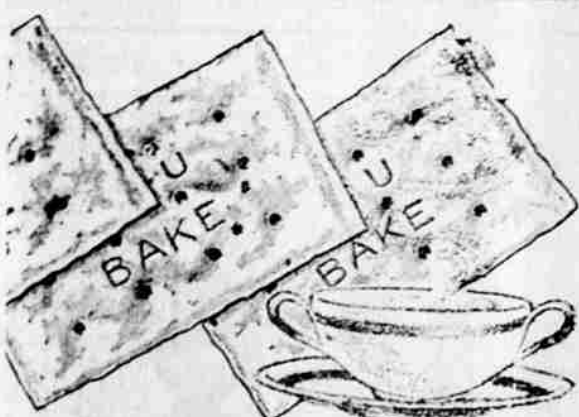
